FASHION HINTS
Many Persian waists are veiled with some sheer fabric, or trimmed with plain silk or satin, which helps to tone them down considerably.
Velvet flowers are coming out for the winter, splendid convolvuli in plain or mixed colorings to be worn on velvet hats.
Swansdown is considerably used for evening scarfs. Tulle and swansdown form a very beautiful combination.
Brown and tan suede leather shoes will be particularly good, because of the rough weave brown fabrics of these shades employed in coats and wraps.
Horn ornaments decorated with cut steel, and either in gold or silver, or decorated therewith, are among the latest types of adornment.
A recent note in Paris hair dressing is the employment of Persian or other silk fabrics from which gowns, turbans or other millinery are made as a sort of bandeau or intertwining for the coiffure.
The empire effect airides, which were so generally adopted in nearly all sections of this country about two years ago, will again come into prominence this winter.
Plain colored satin ribbons made into rosettes are a fad of the moment, hailing from the Stuart period of dress.
Velveteen, corduroy and velvet will be much worn this fall and winter.
Homespun in coarse weave will be favored for school and street wear.
Silk poplins are again fashionable for the one-piece gowns and separate waists. This season, however, they show a jacquard pattern in the same tone as the fabric.
Dark blue and green is the most fashionable color combination. There are heavy cloths with blue and green threads woven closely together, and dark blue fabrics with the hair-line stripes of green.
Extremely wide ribbons will be in great demand for huge bows on large hats.
Black satin tailor-mades show accessories of embroidery, or the delicate Korean hints or in the blues and reds of Bulgaria.
Sleeves for tailored costumes are tighter than ever, and are finished with stitched straps, braiding or turn-over cuffs.
The mannish wool mixtures have first place for tailored suits, but for dressier suits heavy satin and broadcloth will be used.
Neck chains composed of the large gold or silver beads hang about many pretty necks and dangle in front to the waist line.
It is expected that in the autumn fashions chiffons will be much used, over brocade taffetas and figured silks of various descriptions.
Those who ought to know predict that the double box plaits in neckties, as seen in the prevailing style in tailored skirts this fall.
Some entire hats are made of cashmere and Persian silks, and they are very prominent as facings and in the making of millinery accessories.
The Paris hobble skirt seems unlikely to reach this country in its full strength, but it will undoubtedly somewhat influence American fashions.
For the more modest tailor-made gowns, silk and satin prevail in plaids, stripes, dots, coin spots, plaid and checkboard patterns.

ALL MADE OF
HANDKERCHIEFS
Cushions, Bonnets, Blouses and Petticoats Among Pretty Things Which can be Fashioned from Squares.

The handkerchief, regarded through the eyes of a clever woman, is quite a wonderful thing. The expedient of turning the dainty little square to other uses than the technical one of a handkerchief is but the work of a half hour. One edge is turned back to form the rim around the face, and the fullness at the back required for the face all round the edge. These are always welcome gifts and have just the personal note about them that is appreciated.
A little work apron can be made from two large sized handkerchiefs, decorated borders being made to play an important part in the scheme. Two edges of one square are made to form the pointed front, and the sides are obtained by hemming and slanting the material into shape. From another handkerchief the ruffles can be made, and if a plain handkerchief has been used spray of flowers can be embroidered. Ribbon forms the band and strings, and you have a smart little gift for the needlewoman.
Four handkerchiefs are easily folded to make a charming cushion cover for baby. They are folded diagonally through the center, and strips of insertion join the edges, passing from corner to the other. The method of construction is readily seen as soon as the handkerchiefs are folded. When this is accomplished they of course form a square.
Entire blouse and dressing jackets are made from these useful squares. For the dressing sack sleeve the handkerchief should have a hole cut in it to allow the arm to pass through, and a more becoming effect is obtained if the hole is not quite in the center, making the front portion of the handkerchief hang shorter than the back.
An entire petticoat flounce has been made from handkerchief squares and insertion, but this is a lot of work. Still, if one starts thinking about it the list of these handkerchief possibilities is very varied.

FASHIONABLE COLORS FOR 1911.
Even while we're still wondering what to buy for fall and winter, the fashion creators are busy with next spring and next summer. Textiles for 1911 are already well under way.
Novelty colors lead the list for next year, and red does not figure at all. Among the novelties are Russian green, parrot blue and cafe-au-lait. Black is most prominent in the general colors, with blue second and mixtures of black and white third. Then come shades of gray, green, tan, brown and purple.
Popular colors for millinery will be all shades of purple, royal blue, pink, cerise, pheasant brown, and the gray shades.
