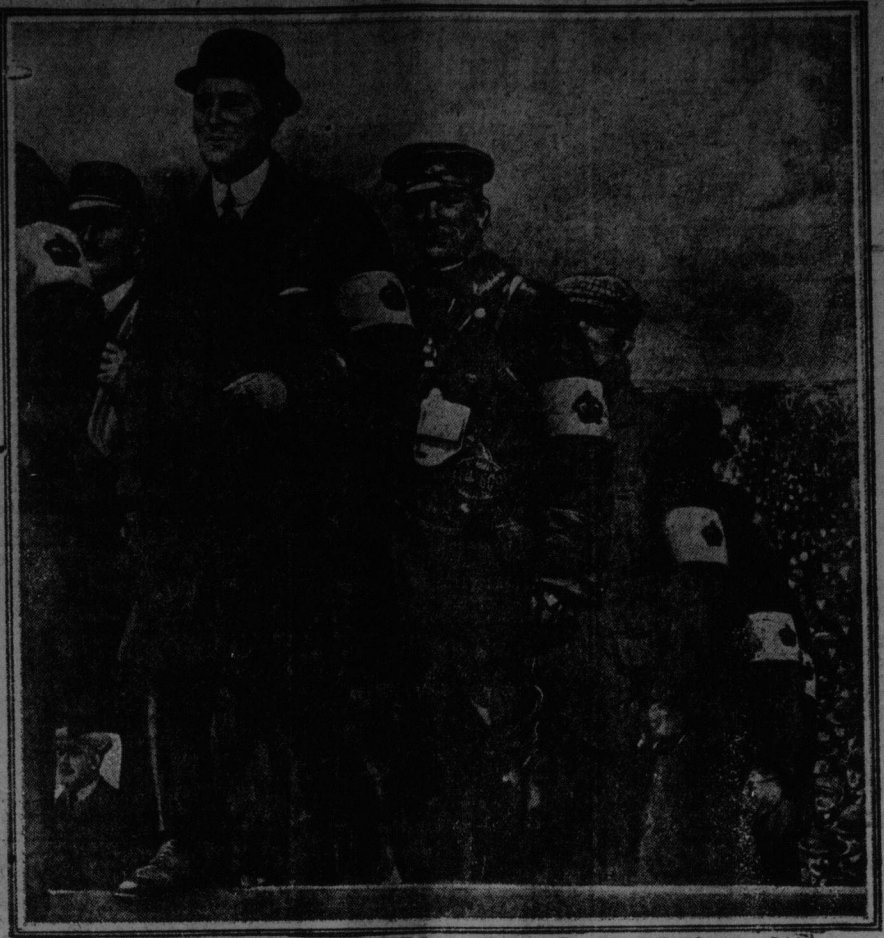

"KILLED" THE WRONG MAN IN ENGLAND WITH TROOPS

"Tip" O'Neil's relatives spent unhappy hours as result of newspaper's stupid blunder. Arrival announced by Press Censor's office--Left Canada on December 18th

Ottawa, Jan. 2.—It is officially announced, through the Chief Press Censor's office, that the troopship Mississauga, which sailed from Canada on December 18, has arrived safely in England. She had on board the following troops: Number Three Siege Battery, 6 officers and 214 men, drafts; Horse Artillery, two officers, 100 men; Field Artillery, 14 officers, 603 men; Winnipeg Highlanders, 6 officers, 249 men; Infantry from Edmonton, 1 officer, 44 men; cyclists, 2 officers, 60 men; Army Service Corps, 5 officers, 200 men; Army Medical Corps, 19 officers, 90 men; dental corps, 20 officers, 60 men; civilian practitioners for regular army 5 officers; naval ratings, two officers, 92 men; details, four officers, six men.

SPECIAL SERVICES OF INTERCESSION IN THE CITY CHURCHES

The Methodist churches of the city held special New Year services yesterday, mostly of an intercessory nature. In Queen Square Rev. Hammond Johnson spoke from Isaiah 59-16. "He wondered there was no intercessor." He spoke of the need of an intercessor and of the fact that we could all act in that capacity. In Carmichael street Rev. Mr. Cripe spoke from Psalm 20-1, "The Lord hear Thee in the day of trouble, the name of the God of Jacob defend thee." In Portland Methodist, Rev. George Steel spoke from the 46th Psalm, verses 1, 2, 3, "God the refuge and help of His people." He said God was always ready to help His people when they called and always would be. In Carleton Methodist Rev. Mr. Westmorland took as his subject, Prayer for the Allied Forces, and based his remarks on Psalm 88-1, "Let God arise and let His enemies be scattered." In Zion Rev. Mr. Champion took as his text "This Year Also," and said: "As God had been with His people in the past year so He would be in the coming." In Exmouth street Rev. Mr. Cripe occupied the pulpit in the morning owing to the illness of the pastor, Rev. Mr. Lane. In Centenary Rev. Mr. Barraclough took as his text: "I said days should speak and multitudes of years should bring wisdom," his subject being the message of the old year. The prayers and hymns were of an intercessory nature. All of the churches had special music at the different services. In the Main street Baptist church the pastor preached a special New Year's sermon in the morning, his subject being "Progress." He took as his text Exodus 14-15, "Speak to the people that they go forward." At the evening service the choir repeated a part of the Christmas music. In all the Catholic churches of the diocese there was read a pastoral letter from His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc, quoting a letter from His Excellency the Apostolic Delegate in reference to the day of intercession. There was also read a letter from the Governor General appealing to the people of Canada to help the Patriotic Fund. At the Cathedral special reference was made during the sermon to these and an appeal was made for full support both in men and money to help the Empire. MONTREAL LAWYER TO ASSIST IN DEFENCE OF LIEUT. CODERRE

London, Jan. 2.—(Montreal Gazette cable)—It is probable that N. K. Laflamme, K. C., of Montreal, will come to England to assist in the defence of Lieut. Coderre, of Sherbrooke, Que., who will face at the February Assizes a charge of murdering Sergt. Ozanne. Although an English barrister and solicitor will be necessary, Mr. Laflamme's counsel in regard to various Canadian aspects of the case would undoubtedly be helpful. Mrs. Coderre is remaining here on advice from Sherbrooke, although her passage had been booked for the Scandinavian, sailing today. She has twice visited her husband in Winchester jail. He eats well, and appears indifferent to the seriousness of his position.

Soldiers' Football Match.

MISS HAZEL DEINSTADT LEAVES SOON FOR FRONT

Rejected first for peculiar reason, she persevered and finally received appointment.

Some months ago Miss Hazel Deinstadt, a daughter of Rev. T. J. Deinstadt, of this city, a graduate nurse, made application for a place with the nurses who were going from Canada on war service and was rejected on account of her name, it being claimed that she was of German descent. Miss Deinstadt was not satisfied to let the matter rest there but set to work to prove that she was a good loyal subject of the Empire. She has been able to convince the War Office that while her name may be German her ancestors were among those who fought for the English flag in the revolutionary war and in which they played no mean part. After peate had been declared they came to this country with the Loyalists and have been living in Canada ever since. Miss Deinstadt has now received an appointment to one of the largest hospitals in France at Arc-en-Barois which has 200 beds and she will leave to take up her duties there about the middle of the month.

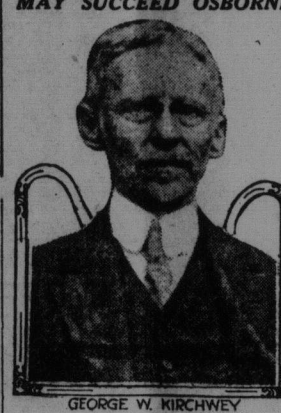
SOME NEW YEAR RING EVENTS

PROVING-WIDE CAMPAIGN FOR THE NEW REGIMENTS

Meetings planned for next two weeks — Battalion areas mapped out. Instructions have been received from headquarters by the recruiting officers throughout the provinces in regard to the division of the 6th military division into battalion areas. The battalion area of the 115th overseas battalion, comprises the counties of St. John, Charlotte, York, Carleton, Victoria and Madawaska. The battalion area of the 140th Overseas Battalion covers Albert, Kings, Queens and Sunbury. While these battalion areas have been established as fixing in a general way, the counties in which it is expected that the battalion will be recruited, the division will interfere with the wishes of the recruits. It is desired by headquarters that recruits should be given the choice as to which battalion they wish to join, and no effort should be made to persuade them from carrying out their wishes. The area of the French-Canadian overseas battalion, the 165th, comprises the Maritime Provinces, and the French-Canadians, and the French-Canadians may recruit with recruiting officers, at any recruiting stations for such recruitments.

MAY SUCCEED OSBORNE

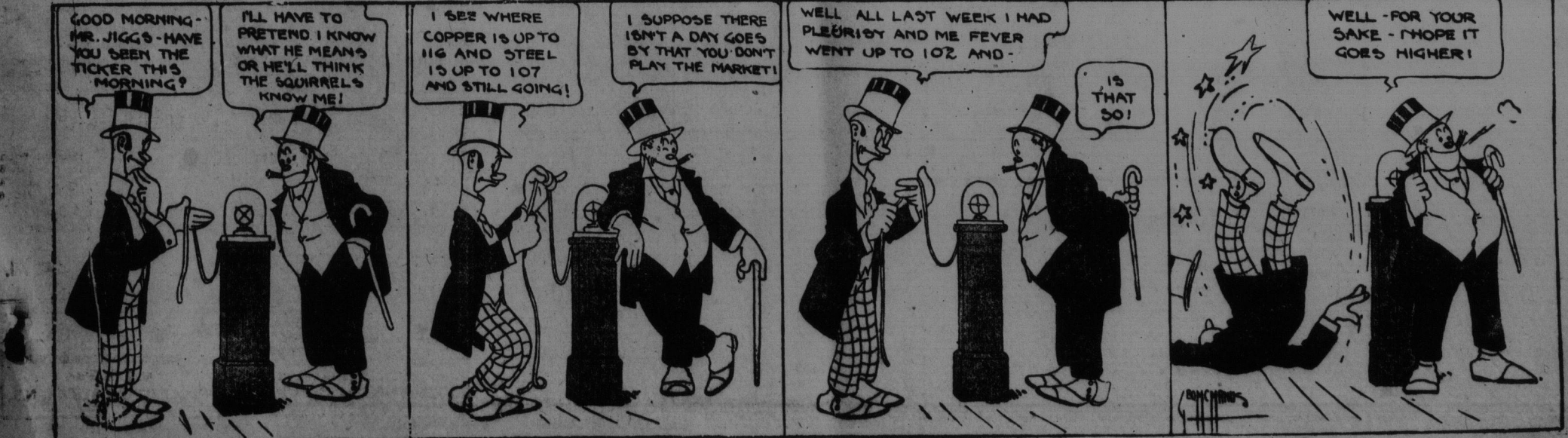
