COOKERY COLUMN. Cocoa Wafers. 3 tablespoons butter, 3 tablespoons milk, 7 tablespoons flour, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract, 5 tablespoons pulverized sugar, 2 tablespoons Cowan's Cocoa, 1 tablespoon chopped nuts. Method:—Add the milk, drop by drop, to creamed sugar and butter, stirring constantly. Add slowly the flour mixed with cocoa. Rub pan with butter. Drop from end of spoon and sprinkle with nuts. Dust with cinnamon. Bake in a slow oven until brown.
