Farmers have been making good use of the fine seeding weather of the past week, following the prolonged wet spell, and most of them will have finished this week. Unseasonably cold weather has kept back the growth of grass, but owing to scarcity of feed cattle are being turned out to pasture earlier perhaps than otherwise would have been the case. The weather is now getting more back to normal.

Mr. Lethbridge of Glencoe gave notice of motion in the Ontario Legislature last week to appoint a committee of the House to go into the question with the Hydro-Electric Power Commission and endeavor to devise some more equitable system of distribution and a more uniform rate throughout the different portions of the province for hydro-electric power. The motion is generally approved in the House.
