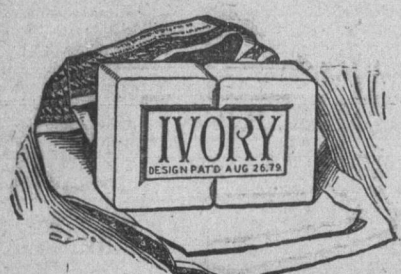

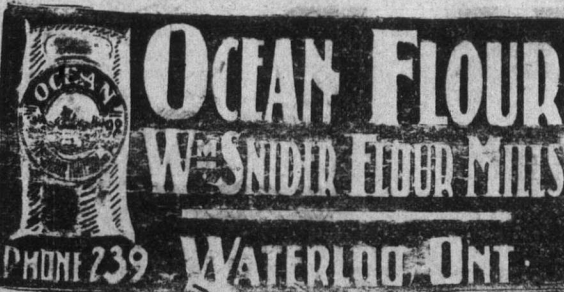

**Was Not Harold.**  
The name of the young man in charge of the automobile on Saturday which was the accident on Joseph street is not Mr. Harold Heuser. The name was wrongly given. The alleged driver was Mr. Arthur Heuser.

**Auto Caught Fire.**  
An alarm was answered by the Fire Department at about 1:35 o'clock Sunday afternoon when a blaze broke out in an automobile at 178 Louisa street. Little damage was caused. The fire was under control before the brigade arrived.

**Sectionman Killed.**  
Albert Holmes, a Michigan Central sectionman, while going to work at Waterloo, was struck and instantly killed by No. 40, fast express. ## SPECIAL SERVICES IN ALMA ST. CHURCH SUNDAY

Evangelist Mrs. M.A. Durham spoke in the morning to a large congregation on the subject "The Home Gathering." Evangelists and Christian workers are the agents of God and heaven. If you want to know about the everlasting home of the blessed, Rev. Dr. 21 tell all about it. ## Rumor About The War Tariff

OTTAWA HEARS THAT IT MAY BE REMOVED.

Ottawa, Jan. 12.—The coming session of Parliament brings rumors as to the legislation that is probable apart from that foreshadowed officially in a statement by Sir Thomas White.

It is reported that the extra duty of 7 1/2 per cent in the general tariff and seven per cent in the preferential, which was imposed in the first session after the war began, will be taken off that farm tractors costing under \$1,400 will be confined on the free list and that the duty on agricultural implements generally will be reduced to 12 1/2 per cent.

If this is done it will probably be all for this year, further adjustments being permitted to await till the peace conference is over, with the economic arrangement incidental to it.
