BUDGET HIGH SPOTS

FROM THE SPEECH OF SIR THOMAS WHITE

The net debt of Canada when all was assessed in 1914 was \$1,950,000,000. The annual interest on this debt was \$115,000,000. The present fiscal year, which began April 1, will be \$450,000,000, and the total expenditure of the Government \$320,000,000. The revenue will not exceed \$280,000,000.

For the past fiscal year there is a surplus of \$70,000,000 in ordinary revenue over expenditure, of which \$48,000,000 has been devoted to war expenditure.

To meet these expenditures there will be another loan, which will be of long-term kind.

"We have a country of almost unlimited natural assets and an enterprising people of great stability of character and ardent aspiration for national and individual success."

Our ability to meet and retire our war obligations will depend on our power to increase our production of natural and manufacturing commodities, to economize individually so as to increase in domestic wealth and savings, and produce a more favorable balance in our international trade. In other words, the motto for the future, as it was in the war, must be "Produce and Save."

"We must increase Canada's population, bringing in particularly that class which will engage in agricultural and other basic industries."

"As a great food producing country Canada is bound to enjoy agricultural prosperity."

"In view of conditions in Europe Canada's agriculture will not lack for profitable markets for all it can produce. Exports of this kind should go far towards insuring most favorable trade balances for the future."

"Every effort should be made to develop and expand our export trade in manufactured articles as well as in the immediate natural products."

"Our policy should be directed to insuring the greatest value of finished articles as compared with that of raw materials or partly manufactured articles."

"In order to meet keen international competition the Government will give assistance in information, transportation and financial facilities."

"During the five years from 1914 to 1919 Canada's total trade doubled, while for the year 1918, which marked the highest point, it aggregated 2 1/2 times the trade of 1914."

"It wouldn't be practicable at this time," he said, "to make a sound general revision of the tariff. International trade is most unsettled, still hampered by the war restrictions and prohibitions and by exchange conditions which are any may long continue to be subject to violent fluctuations.
