CARMICHAEL GOES TO HYDRO NEXT WEEK

The Premier stated that Col. D. Carmichael, minister without portfolio, will not take his place on the hydro commission as a representative of the government until next week. "Col. Carmichael is just a working water test," the Premier said. "I think it will be found that Col. Carmichael is one of the very best men in the whole province for the place."

Hon. Harry Mills, Minister of Mines, will sit as minister without portfolio on the hydro commission. The portfolio of Mines must be created by act of the legislature. In the meantime Mr. Bowman (Lands and Forests), and Mr. Mills will have reached an agreement as to how the Department of Lands, Forestry and Mines will be divided. Mr. Mills will however be on duty during the intervening time."

one crown.
Waterloo Township: \$60,000.

Special subscriptions total \$7,230,500.
