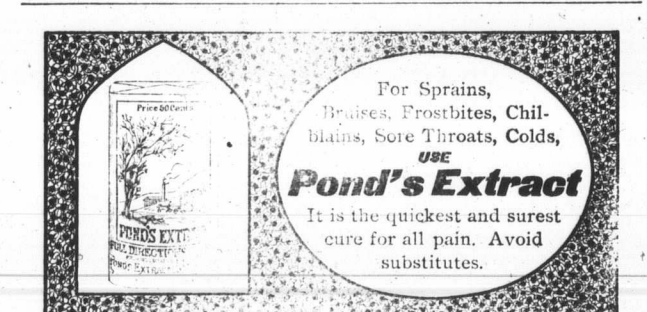

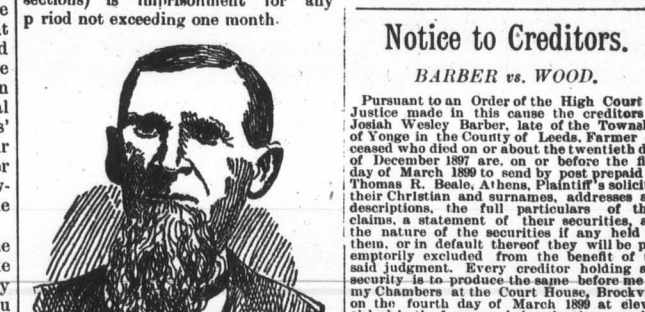

PROCLAMATION. Whereas, in the opinion of the Municipal Health Authorities of the Township of the Rear of Young and Escott in the County of Leeds, Province of Ontario, there is danger of Smallpox breaking out owing to the facility of communication with infected localities, I hereby give notice that Section 10 of the Vaccination and Isolation Act, of Ontario, is in force in the said Township of the Rear of Young and Escott. The said Act requires all children to be vaccinated, and all persons who have not been vaccinated within seven years of the date of this proclamation, shall be sufficient evidence to secure the conviction of such persons who do not comply with the law within a period of seven days from the publication of this proclamation. The Medical Health Officer of the above Township has the honor to request that the schoolhouses in each School Section of the Township and in other persons who come to such schools may be vaccinated, and all persons of the date and time of the attendance of such Medical Officer will be given by the Sanitary Inspector of the Township, who is at Athens this 16th day of February, A.
