

Geology artifact hassles

A report urging the appointment of a full time director to handle all university historical collections ran into opposition at a general faculties council meeting Monday.

The geology department, with the largest collection of artifacts on campus, with more than 200,000 items, objected to the amount of control given to the director in the

In a letter to GFC, the chairman of the department, Lambert, said the Richard department prefers to take care of its own artifacts and a director is not required.

The geology collection, open to the public, consists of fossils, rocks, minerals, meteorites and other special items presented to the department.

In December James Parker, university archivist urged the appointment of a full-time director at a \$20,000 salary and warned that university collections were in a state of near collapse.

They are in such a neglected state that it casts a reflection on the status of the university, he

Donald Ross, dean of science, told GFC it was clear that there are two types of collections, works of art and

works of science.
"I see no need to establish general control or cataloguing of science collections.'

Henry Kreisel, academic vice-president, called for an interim measure, since the cataloging of the collections has iust started and it is not yet known what will be needed.

Parker reported about one third of the cataloguing is about one-third finished.

GFC suggested that Parker take account of the discussion and make whatever changes in the report he saw fit before he presented it to the University Planning Committee.

Many alumni contribute money to the university each year through the annual Development Fund Campaign. These funds have in the past been designated to assist particular areas of the university such as the 3AU Capital Fund, the Centre for the Study of Mental Retardation, the Library and the Boreal Institute.
