A-204 Yes, sir.

Q-205 You would not need to put on the hut lights?

A-205 No, sir.

Q-206 Did you ask Private Boudreau or Adams what they were doing in the hut at that time?

A-206 No, sir, I didn't.

Q-207 What time was that?

A-207 Approximately one o'clock, sir.

Q-208 Why did you not ask them what they were doing there?

A-208 The reason for not asking them is: there is often times when one of the pals of the fellows is a little worse for liquor and unruly and they stay with him until he goes to sleep rather than see him get into trouble and that was my opinion when I saw him there.

Q-209 Is it customary have these men remaining about in the hut?

A-209 I have seen it.

Q-210 Is it common?

A-210 It is not common but I have seen the occasional case.

Q-211 You did not think of investigating their being there?

A-211 They were not molesting anyone so I paid no attention.

Q-212 Did you speak to the accused, Private Adams?

A-212 No, I did not.

QUESTIONED BY THE JUDGE ADVOCATE:

Q-213 You saw Boudreau before you saw Adams, is that correct?

A-213 Yes, sir.

Q-214 How long was it between when you saw one and then the other?

A-214 Just a matter of seconds, possibly a minute or two.

Q-215 How far apart were they again?

A-215 One was at the side entrance, which is the end of our hut, and the other one was somewhere in the other end of the hut, which would be twenty-five or thirty feet.
