Autos Collide on Highway
Last Sunday night, about 10:30, as Mrs. E. V. Kahlbach, with her sisters, Mrs. J. V. Bersch and Mrs. L. Kahlbach, and her sons Orville, Claude and Grant, and her niece, Joan Bersch, were returning home from Woodstock in their Ford Sedan, a Chevrolet Cabriolet, driven by Elmer Dahms, collided with them opposite J. G. Thomson's farm on the Flora Road. The occupants of the Ford say that they noticed the Chevy approaching on the wrong side of the road, and the driver, Claude Kahlbach, applied the brakes and brought his machine down to ten miles an hour. The Chevy driver, noticing his position, pulled off toward his right, but not quickly enough to avoid a collision with the Kahlbachs, and his nose was crushed and cut four stitches before he started to close the cuts. Mrs. Dahms was thrown from the rear of the car, and sustained bruises and a badly gashed arm. Her daughter, Joan, received a blow in her head which required stitches to close. The other occupants of the Kahlbach car were badly bruised. A passing truck hurried them to Dr. Carpenter's office in town. The Dahms was accompanied by his brother, Emmanuel, but neither of the cars was badly hurt. Both cars were badly wrecked, and are now undergoing repairs.

Kunkel and Jack Schurr, on the back line, were in action again, and had little trouble in warding off their opponents' attack. They were ably supported by the half-backs, Geo. Scheffer, Clem. Illig and Gordon Lobsinger, who are in fine form. The forward line—Raybould, Walker, Lutkin, Harper and Kaufman are working together nicely, and their work was very effective. Mr. Howard, who came from the West recently, and works for Thos. H. Jasser, played a fine game as half-back at Chesley, and will find a permanent place with the Stars.
