Only Lesueur's work in goal saved Ottawa from a bad beating. Smith resumed and immediately went through the Ottawa defence, making it 4 to 2, with a wicked shot.

In the second period Tommy Smith, who was the individual star of the night, marred his performance by putting Eddie Lowery out of the game with a wicked blow over the read. Then Darragh forced Marks to retire with a bad cut over the left eye.
