FARMERS TO FORCE GOVERNMENT'S HAND

Grain Growers in the Three Provinces to Meet in Convention at Regina and Discuss Nationalization of Elevator System—Delegation to Ottawa.

Some time ago The West announced that the grain growers of the three provinces were considering the advisability of holding an inter-provincial convention at Regina to further the organization, strengthening their position and consolidating their policy. The following article from the Winnipeg Tribune shows that the scheme has now reached a further stage of development.

A member of the Grain Growers' Association writing to the Tribune from Brandon a few days ago, gave some information which has enabled the Tribune to secure further information of a very important character. It will be recalled that when the Grain Growers' executive met in Winnipeg some days ago, they waited on the local government and discussed with its members the proposed changes in the Grain Exchange act, as well as other questions which have been hanging over the grain growers and the local government. The question of for a year or more, the local government taking over the elevators in the province and administering them was discussed very fully and as stated in the press at the time, Mr. Roblin pointed out the difficulties, which on examination will be apparent to every lay mind.

The Dominion grain act is a federal measure covering all questions relating to the grading and handling of grain in the three western provinces. Were the local government to take over the elevators in the province, it would still be under the jurisdiction of the Dominion grain act and it will be evident that there would be constant friction, and the result would be far from satisfactory.

The members of the executive, after considering the question for some time, reached the decision that the difficulties were of a very serious nature and it was decided to abandon for the present the idea of provincial ownership of elevators and see what could be done with the Dominion authorities.

It will be remembered years ago, when the question of handling grain became such an important one in the west, that the agitation resulted in the passing of the Dominion grain act. Some far seeing people took objection at the time, saying that it

would be better to fall back on the old common law and general railway act, which obliges railway companies to supply the necessary accommodation for all shippers who desire to use the railways. Under this clause, if the matter had been presented at the time, the railway companies themselves would have been obliged to provide the elevators, and it is now universally recognised that this would have been very much better than the present system of company owned elevators. Had the railway companies been compelled to provide the storage accommodation (as they are obliged to do in all other classes of freight) it would have resulted in an immense saving to farmers, and there is little doubt that it would have obviated the immense trouble and agitation that has occurred during the last ten or fifteen years.

It is now proposed to call a monster convention of the grain growers from the three provinces to meet at some central point, say Regina, at an early date, probably within three weeks. At this convention it is proposed to take up the question of the federal government owning all the elevator systems in its broadest sense. If the feeling is found to be strongly in favor of the nationalization of the elevator system, and the convention decides upon that course, it is proposed to send a strong delegation at once to Ottawa, so that the government may be, if possible, forced to take action this session, or at least obliged to declare their policy. It is recognised that the general elections will be probably be held early next summer, perhaps as soon as the House prorogues, and the intention is to force the issue to the front in connection with the political contest. If the Laurier government declines either to take the necessary steps or promise to nationalize the elevators, at the earliest possible moment, then the intention is to turn to the opposition, and no doubt the bulk of the great farming community can be influenced one way or the other in order to secure what must be recognised as one of the greatest boons that can be conferred on the country. Our correspondent stated that he had discussed the question with a number of the people and that he found the utmost enthusiasm prevailing with regard to the proposition.

ANOTHER RAILWAY WRECK

Several Westerners Lose Their Lives—Broken Rail The Cause—The Sad Case of Mrs. Ben Sloan, of Fielding, Sask.

North Bay, Jan. 3.—Another fatal wreck occurred a mile and a quarter east of here this morning. The No. 2 eastbound express being derailed by a broken eighty pound rail. The baggage, colonist and coach, left the track and were turned on their sides. Mrs. Sloan was killed, Alex. Ross of Dundurn, lost his right hand; Wm. Reynolds of Montreal; Lewis Hardie, Deloraine; E. Perkins, Port Arthur; David Lindsay; Ed. McDougall, Paynton, Sask.; Dan McDougall, St. Almon, Ont., and A. Gilchrist, Glenora, Ont., suffered severe cuts on their heads; Robert Matthews, Moose Jaw had his back hurt. Jas. Hale and Jas. Stanley, C.P.R. employees at Chapleau, were also injured.

The passengers in the forward cars were penned in, and the work of extracting them by the trainmen, and fellow passengers was speedily begun. The worst horror was the finding of a woman's body in the lavatory, where she was crushed to death, her head and arms protruding through the broken side of the car, and her body swaying in the water of the creek, which covered the floor of the car for several feet. It was impossible to release the remains for several hours, but death must have been instantaneous. The unfortunate lady was Mrs. Ben Sloan, of Fielding, Sask. Shortly before she had spoken of the surprise she would give her sister in Lindsay, Ont., who was not

aware of her prospective visit. A husband and children survive her. Engineer Stanley, on his way to Schreiber as a passenger, was badly injured about the head, his arm was broken and one eye seriously injured, besides internal injuries. He was removed to the Sudbury hospital.
