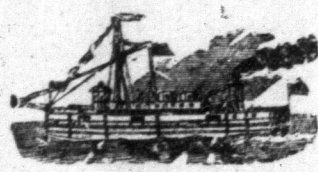

THE OPENING HOME GAME.

To one, Ray Hale, pitcher, and incidentally wicker of the wagon tongue besides, can be chalked down the comparatively easy victory of the Reds in their opening home game with the Saginaws yesterday. He had speed and benders to throw to the winds and he threw them with the result that the enemy was at sea from start to finish, and to his own victory batted in Chatham's first four runs, O'Connell's three-bagger clearing the bases for the last three.

There was a splendid crowd present and the city band marshalled the procession to the grounds, where Ald. Geo. W. Sulman, acting mayor, in his usual suave and cheerful style, delivered a short, address welcoming the visitors and enlivened clean and gentlemanly ball-playing. Then Hale took the ball, the Indians trotted to the field amid applause and the game was on.

The Chatham's show a marvellous improvement in their work. They were full of life and ginger and, although Miller held their hitting prowess in check, they were fast on the bases and utilized the charities extended. Until the eighth inning they played without an error and only a little carelessness in the ninth enabled the Saginaws to escape the ignominy of a shut-out.
