Tar Macadam Will in All Likelfshood be Tried First.

It is quite probable that tar Macadam will be used for the new pavement on Col-borne street. The Pianet called attention recently to the fact that this class of pavement was being used in Hamilton, with

great success.
"I am not able to say what we will do,"
said Ex-Mayor Campbell to The Planet.
"The board of works have the matter in "The board of works have the matter in hand and you will have to find out from them. I think they intend to put down Macadam pavement similar to that on Wellington street. The only fault it has, I learn, is that the stone loosens and comes up with the mud. The tar Macadam is laid just the same way I understand. On y tar is used in the top dressing to pack the stone tighter. Probably the defect in the wellington street pavement would be overcome in this way. However, I know very
little about it. I have often seen the
Hamilton pavement but never took any
particular notice of it. It certainly must
be good. Forty teams pass over it to one
that will pass over the Colborne street
Macadam so that what serves Hamilton will
much better serve here.

Ald. Marshall, a member of the board of works, said: "We have decided to put down Macadam pavement similar to the Wellington street work. We intend, however, to fully look into the tar payement and see what it is like. The tar is used in the top dressing so that we can have plenty of time to fully inquire into the merits of its use. It will cost 35 or 40 cents a square yard more but even then it wouldn't cost as much as the Wellington street pavement which came to about twice as much as there was any need for."
