REV. JOHN E. HUNTER,

The well known evangelist, was born n Durham County, Ont., July 29th, 1856. His boyhood days were spent on a farm where he acquired the physical vigor necessary for the arduous labors of an evangelist. He was brought up a Presbyterian, but at the age of fifteen Presbyterian, but at the age of fifteen was converted in a Methodist revival, and four years later was called, like Eusha of old, from the plough to the pulpit. His circuits became the centres of extensive revivals, and also many other fields where he assisted in special services. During his probation, Mr. Hunter spent two years at Victoria College, and shortly after his ordination, on the 12th of July, 1882, was married to Miss Jennie Jones, of Essex, He was then by his own request trans-He was then by his own request transferred to the Mamitoba Conference, where he continued in the pastorate until the conviction of his call to evan gelistic work becoming more intense the, in July, 1884, joined Mr. Crossley, and the two went forth, like flaming evangels, through the principal towns and cities of the Dominion, gathering thousands into the churches. Mr. Hunter is of Irish descent, and possess. es all that keenness of perception, nervous sensibility and tendency to wit, so characteristic of the Irish people. He is also endowed with much of that peculiar force called magnetism, which peculiar force called magnetism, and conattracts and holds attention and constitutes its possessor a leader of men. He is a man of power in the pulpit, his Bible readings are intensely practical and interesting, and his exhortations, in their melting pathos ed appeal, are unique and full of per-suasive power. He shows marvellous tact in managing a revival meeting, no general on the field of battle having more perfect control of his forces. God has endowed bim for this special work. REV. H. T. CROSSLEY,

Evangelist, is a Canadian of English and Irish descent. He was born in the County of York, Ont., on Nov. 19th, 1850. His boyhood was spent on a farm. At the age of 19 he received a Hist-class provincial certificate from the Toronto Normal School, after which he taught school at Cuiloden for four years. He continued his education some years later at Victoria Univers-ity, preparing for his life work. Mr. years. Mr. Crossley was religiously inclined from a child, and, at the age of 17, was converted and joined the Methodist church. When 23 years of age he entered the ministry and spent 10 years in the regular work of the church as pastor. During his pastorate he saw the fruits of his labor, many being converted, not only on his own circuits, but on other charges where he was invited to help his brethren. In 1884, by consent of his Conference, he began the work of an evangelist, and from that time until now he and his co-laborer. Rev. John E. THEY FOUND THE GUNBOAT

Several Chatham Antiquaries Inspect the Hull of the Old Scow

Which General Proctor Fank Near Pike. ville to Save it From the Americans.

The Chatham Historical Research Society, otherwise known as the Relic Hunters, took a prospecting jaunt up to Pikeville yesterday afternoon, to examine the well-preserved hull of the Canadian gunboat scuttled or sunk by Gen. Proctor, when, during the war of 1812-13, he was retreating before the advancing Americans.

Last June, Samuel C. Kearney, who fishes logs and things out of the river, located the boat while following his usual occupation. Lately, perceiving the lowness of the water in the river, Mr. Kearney realized that the gunhoat, which he had discovered, must be very near the surface of the water. He informed President Jones of the Research Society, of his find and his belief. Mr. Jones at once called a meeting of the society to investigate Mr. Kearney's find. Four active members responded to the call of their chief. They were Pres. E. B. Jones, Vice-president R. C. Burt, Assistants

Thomas Arnoid and Samuel Kearney, also Photographer A. S. Park, whose duty it is to photograph all finds of the society.

The ice, on which Mr. Jone and Mr. Burt were standing, gave warning crack; Mr. Jones leaped to a place of safety, across the channel which had been cut in the work of exposing the boat to view, but Mr. Burrunfortunately landed in the middle of the channel, where the water was both cold and wet. Chutching the ice on the other side, he scrambled hurriedly from his cold and perilous position. The section of the boat exposed to view was now carefully examined. It was found that the boat had been built of oa i. The ribs were in good condi-tion; the outside planking still re-mained intact, and was of two-inch oak. In some places the inner sheeting was still visible. Huge wrought-iron spikes had been used in the construction, and rows of these could be plainly

Burth had been search ing around with a steel prod, and he fished out a piece of one of the oal fished out a piece of one of tribs twelve, by six, by five inch Burt was highly pleased with his find and brought it carefully home.

It is in the rear of the former residence of Squire John Delmage and about 500 yards above Pikeville bridge, on the South bank of the river. He found two anchors in the niver near Pikeville last summer, and he also located another of Proctor's gun boats, sunk in six feet of water near the old Fisher homest and up the nera the old Fisher homestead up the river, The boat is now so covered with sand that it is impossible to tell much about it.
