SEIZE MUNITIONS OF WAR.

General Captures Rifles and Ammu-
nition From Sultan of Morocco.

Tangier, Oct. 7.—Advices received
here from Mazagan give details of the
recent important success for Mulai
Hafid, brother of Sultan Abd-el-Aziz,
who at the head of two armies is con-
testing for the Sultanate.

The Sultan, it appears, sent a num-
ber of machine guns, 3,000 rifles and
1,000,000 cartridges to Mazagan for the
use of the imperial troops which were
destined to operate against Hafid's
forces.

About midnight Oct. 3 one of Ha-
fid's general succeeded in entering
Mazagan, seizing all the war mu-
nitions of the Sultan and despatching
them to the headquarters of Mulai
Hafid, one of whose armies is under-
stood to be approaching Fes, the Mo-
roccan capital.

All the native and many of the for-
eign reports agree that the movement
headed by Hafid is arousing national
enthusiasm throughout the empire.
Abd-el-Aziz, in the meanwhile, is ap-
parently hemmed in at Rabat. His
preparations to enter the French
territories, M. Bagnant, and the Span-
ish minister, are regarded as mainly
intended to further his efforts to ob-
tain a loan of \$2,000,000, which, it is
said, instead of being used to pay the
troops, would be devoted to carrying
on the Sultan's campaign against his
popular rival, Mulai Hafid.

WAR ON THE PRESS.

C. P. R. Refuse to Receive Despatches
For Winnipeg Papers.

Winnipeg, Man., Oct. 7.—The fight
between the C. P. R. Telegraph Co.
and the western newspapers is rapidly
reaching a climax.
The C. P. R. on Saturday refused
absolutely to handle any news for the
local papers, and have notices posted
giving their operators orders to take
no stuff.

The Telegram correspondents at
Saskatoon tried two hours to get a story
through, but failed entirely.
The Edmonton Journal, editorially
condemns the C. P. R., and says
"The issue with respect to Govern-
ment ownership of telegraph and tele-
phone is intensified, however, much
we regret the circumstances, by the
attitude assumed rightly or wrongly
by the C. P. R., and in view of this
the duty of the people seems clear to
support Mr. Borden in his effort to
obtain for them a speedy, wholly
beyond party control."

R. L. Borden, speaking at Calgary,
said: "Government ownership of tele-
graph and telephones is also another
question of importance. Great Brit-
ain has had them for years and why
not we. The Conservative party will
establish such a system of telegraph
and telephones if we get into power.
The way things are carried on at pre-
sent is a disgrace."

CONDEMN THE LORDS.

British Premier Hopes to See Them
in Sackcloth and Ashes.

Edinburgh, Oct. 7.—Premier Sir
Henry Campbell-Bannerman returned
to the attack on the House of Lords
Saturday evening, when, in an address
before a great gathering of Scottish
Liberals here, he reviewed the mea-
sures that had been rejected by the
House.

He dwelt with vehemence upon what
he called the arrogance and high-
handedness of the House, and said he
hoped to see them in sackcloth and
ashes before another session had gone
by.

It was the intention of the Govern-
ment to send certain bills back again
to the House of Lords after their pas-
sage, proforma, by the House of Com-
mons.

Whatever the result, the Premier
said he believed that on the main
issue the Government must ultimately
go to the country, and he knew that
it would not appeal in vain.

Lusitania Is Off Again.

Liverpool, Oct. 7.—With nearly 3,000
passengers of all classes on board, the
new Cunarder Lusitania left here on
Saturday night on her second voyage
to New York. There is much interest
in this trip, as there is a widespread
belief that a real attempt to eclipse
the record of the Hamburg-American
liner Deutschland will be made.

It is declared that the British Ad-
miralty is looking to this voyage for
evidence of speed powers, as the
agreement between the Government
and the Cunard Co. regarding the sub-
sidy of \$750,000 a year now comes into
force. This subsidy is to be reduced
if the agreed average speed is not
maintained.

Queenstown, Oct. 7.—The Cunard
gleaner ship Lusitania, which sailed
from Liverpool for New York Satur-
day night, made rapid progress to this
port, averaging 24 knots an hour. The
vessel left here for New York at 10.30
o'clock yesterday morning.

Ontario Bank Claim.

Toronto, Oct. 7.—The statement of
claim has been filed in the suit of the
Ontario Bank against its former presi-
dent, G. B. R. Cockburn.

It charges that Mr. Cockburn trans-
ferred 278 shares of Ontario Bank
stock to the officers' guarantee fund,
and had credited to himself for it
\$37,599.

One paragraph of the claim is:
"The said sum of \$37,599 was by
the defendant applied to his own use
by withdrawing the same from the
Richmond street branch of the plain-
tiff bank. The said transactions were
not authorized by the board of direc-
tors."

Roastand Operated On.

Bayonne, France, Oct. 7.—Dr. Poz-
zi, the celebrated surgeon, yesterday
operated upon Edmond Roastand, the
poet and playwright, for appendicitis.
The operation was pronounced to be
successful, and the condition of the
patient is said to be satisfactory.

Silence Golden.

Topeka, Kas., Oct. 7.—The Supreme
Court yesterday ordered the Interna-
tional Harvester Co. and the Standard
Oil Co. to answer questions filed by
the Attorney-General in the suit
pending. The companies had refused
to answer.
