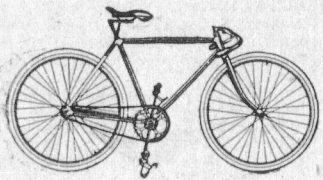

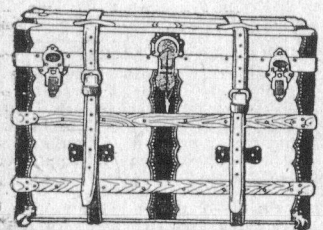

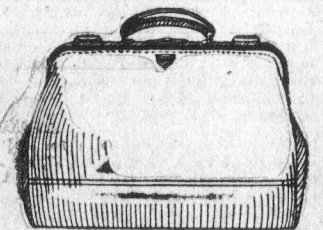

CUBA IS IN A FERMENT

Impossible To Predict The Results But May Lead To Annexation

GEN. BANDERA HACKED

New Orleans, La., Aug. 24.—The Pinar del Rio special cable from Havana says:

In spite of Government denials the revolutionary movement in Cuba has assumed formidable proportions. The whole island is in a ferment over the uprising and it is impossible to predict at this time what the final result will be.

The Government claims that it will be able to suppress the revolt within two or three weeks, but conservative people do not believe that the revolution can be crushed so easily.

The revolutionists have been preparing for the struggle ever since the presidential election, and the Palma administration has underestimated their strength.

Arms From United States. It is known that several cargoes of arms and ammunition have been landed in Cuba from the Florida coast during the past two months, and the insurgents are abundantly supplied with war material.

It is believed by many Havana business men that it will be necessary for the United States to intervene and annex the island before the revolution will be crushed. Annexation is openly favored by the commercial interests in all of the larger cities and towns in Cuba. The revolutionary leaders even prefer annexation to the United States to a continuation of the present conditions.

The American residents on the Isle of Pines have taken sides with the revolutionists against the Palma Government, and they are giving the insurgents all the aid possible. The Isle of Pines will be an important base of operations for the revolutionists.

Asks U. S. For Guns. Havana, Aug. 24.—The Cuban Government has asked the United States that eight rapid-fire guns, manned by American artillerists, be sent to this island to assist in subduing the insurrection.

It is not admitted that this is equivalent to a call for intervention, under the terms of the Platt amendment, and indeed intervention is regarded by the press and public as a remote possibility. Public opinion seems to vary according to locality, from enthusiastic adherence to the Government to open rebellion. In this city the general attitude is one of loyalty, but there has been nothing which could be fairly described as a general rising of the people in defence of the Government.

Bandera Hacked With Machetes. Havana, Aug. 24.—The body of the negro, Gen. Quintin Bandera, the most daring insurgent in Havana, was found in the morgue at Havana to-day, flanked by those of two mulatto comrades, all frightfully gashed by the long, heavy machetes of the mounted rural guards, who ended their career. Across the street, in Membrillo Park, a great crowd, mostly negroes, frantically were watching the morgue with silent interest.

The arrival of Bandera's body here was the first news of the fight in which he met his death. The conflict occurred at the Silvera farm, near Punta Arenas, 15 miles from Havana. Thirty mounted rural guards, under Capt. Ignacio Del Gado and Lieut. Martinez, were searching throughout the night for Bandera's party.

At 2 a. m. the rural guards were breaking through a wire fence at the edge of the Silvera farm, when they were suddenly fired upon by Bandera's 20 followers.

The guards rushed upon the insurgents, but with the exception of their chief and his two leading comrades, they all escaped. The guards made the chief and his companions a special target and all three received several bullet wounds and were horribly mutilated. Not one of the guards was wounded.

The bodies of Bandera and his companions were placed in a wagon and brought to Havana.

Threatens to Blow Up British Road. Havana, Aug. 24.—General Manager Lively of the Western Railway, yesterday afternoon received a personal message from Pino Guerra, forwarded from San Juan de Matanzas saying:

"I am in possession of your station. If any more troops are sent over the Western Railway, I will blow up the bridge and destroy your property."

Later, Guerra again wired to Mr. Lively, saying:

"If you send any more troops over the Western Railway, I will blow up the bridge and destroy your property, irrespective of any international complications or any other consideration."

Mr. Lively carried the message directly to the Secretary of the Interior, with whom he held a consultation. The Western Railway is a British corporation.

Another trainload of troops was sent from Havana westward yesterday afternoon.

Probably Drowned. Belleville, Aug. 24.—From the published description of clothing found in a derelict ship, picked up by the steamer Picton on Tuesday, it is believed that they were worn by Henry Assestine of this city, who disappeared some days ago.

Knocked Out of Cab Window. Bradford, Aug. 24.—While leaning out of the cab window of his new car yesterday morning, William Newton, a freeman on a freight train, was hit by a post and knocked out of his seat. He died before reaching the hospital. He lives at Harrington.

In Spain Again. San Sebastian, Spain, Aug. 24.—King Alfonso and Queen Victoria arrived here from England yesterday and proceeded without incident to the Miramar Palace.

BANDITS AT VALPARAISO

Cut Ears And Fingers Off Wife Of President Montt

BUSINESS IS RE-OPENING

Lima, Peru, Aug. 24.—Further details received here yesterday from Valparaiso, Chili, show that out of 40 employees of the Telephone Co., 38 were killed.

When the house of President-elect Montt collapsed, his wife fell from the balcony into the street, and bandits, who were passing, cut off her ears and fingers to rob her of her jewelry. She was taken in a dying state on board the Chilean warship O'Higgins. Among the dead at Valparaiso is Frederico Varella, the famous capitalist and politician.

Considerable alarm is felt here, in view of the conditions in Chili, as no food products are coming from that republic to Peru, and the latter does not produce sufficient for the use of her inhabitants. Therefore, partial starvation, at least, is feared, faces the middle and poorer classes of the Peruvian population.

Fears of Pestilence.

Valparaiso, Chili, Aug. 24.—Some of the business houses here reopened yesterday for the first time since the earthquake. Telephone and telegraph communication with Santiago has been re-established, but the lines are almost exclusively used by the Government officials.

The city is still under martial law; traffic ceases at 6 o'clock in the evening, and everybody is compelled to take some part in the work of restoration.

At a first instalment, the Government has appropriated \$4,000,000 for the relief of the destitute. The custom house was reopened yesterday, and traffic by water and by rail has been resumed. The post service is also in operation.

Can't Bury the Dead.

One of the greatest difficulties encountered by the authorities is the burial of the bodies recovered from the ruins, as all the cemeteries were destroyed. At the temporary morgues, heaps of coffins have accumulated. The work of recovering the bodies is being pushed to the utmost in order to avoid this epidemic, in fear of which many families are leaving the city.

Survivors of the earthquake say that during the shocks it was impossible to stand erect without support.

All the provinces of the north and south which have not suffered from the earthquake are sending supplies of food and money to the stricken cities and towns.

Valparaiso is still without street lights at night, but order is maintained, thanks to the severity of the authorities, who continue shooting all persons who are caught committing robberies.

3,000 Houses Condemned. Santiago, Chili, Aug. 24.—It was announced yesterday that the Ministry of Public Works has been advised that it will be necessary to abolish more than 3,000 houses here, as the result of damages from earthquake shocks.

Measures have been taken to suppress all overcharging for the necessities of life by merchants. The municipality is selling fresh meat to the inhabitants.

Third Report: Soon Ready.

Toronto, Aug. 24.—There was a council meeting yesterday afternoon, but Acting-Premier Foy stated that only routine business was transacted. Hon. Adam Beck stated that the Hydro-Electric Commission had approved, and would soon file their third interim report, dealing with the Lake Huron and Georgian Bay district, from Goderich up to French River, including Sudbury. The Commission has also about completed its report respecting the St. Lawrence and Ottawa rivers district.

Bad Cuts In His Head.

Toronto, Aug. 24.—Thomas Gooderham, a bricklayer, 45 years of age, is laid up in his house, 11 Garnet avenue, with a couple of bad cuts on his head. Tony Ross and his brother, Sam, of 175 Centre street, Italians, are locked up in No. 7 station on a charge of wounding. The Italians say that Gooderham insisted upon their buying a drink, when the mix-up followed.

Mob Shoots Negro Dead.

Columbia, S. C., Aug. 24.—Willie Spain, a negro, 23 years of age, was shot to death by a mob near St. George, Dorchester County, yesterday. He admitted having gone to the residence of S. L. Comer with the intention of entering it. He was frightened away. The mob strung him to a tree and shot 500 bullets into his body.

Rain Puts Out Fires.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Aug. 24.—Heavy rain fell for several hours yesterday morning, putting out fires which have been running over this end of the upper peninsula, Manitoulin Island and Northern Ontario.
