THE NATURAL GAS FRANCHISE

Agreement With Symmes & Co. Drawn Up and Bylaw Passed

CLAUSES OF CONTRACT

Once the signature of Mr. Symmes and those of the Mayor and Clerk are attached, the document will become law. The following is a synopsis of the terms of the agreement:

1. The gas company to begin operations to pipe the city 60 days after the signing of the agreement, and to put up \$10,000 bonds, which are to be approved of by the Council.

2. The gas company to continue operations, and be ready to deliver natural gas to the citizens of Ohatham not later than July 1, 1907.

3. The company to lay pipes and mains on all streets where contracted for, on a basis of 12.1-2 per cent.

4. The company to do no digging or treaching till plans for such have been submitted to and approved of

been submitted to and approved of by the City Engineer.

5. The company to repair all breaks and damages to streets.

6. In laying the mains the com-pany must be responsible for all damage to premises, and they must not block traffic on any street. Lamps must be placed over their work at night where trenching has been done.

7. The rates for natural gas to be:
For heating and cooking purposes, 20e per thousand cubic feet for the first five years, 25c for the third five years, and 30e for the balance of the term of the franchise: for manufacturing purposes: 10e first five years, 212 1-2c the second five years, and 15c for the balance of the term of the contract; for corporation purposes: 5c per thousand cubic feet for gas used at the city schools, the Police Court, the market, etc., and 10c for that used at the waferworks and electric light station.

8. That the city shall not be responsible for any damage resulting from the gas company repairing or altering the city streets.

9. Thut the company pay loss as aforesaid.

10. In case of the company neglect-

10. In case of the company neglecting to keep the terms of the by-law, that the corporation be empowered to bring action against them to compel them so to do.

As well be noticed a few minor alternations had been made to the agreement, and after discussing the matter in committee of the whole last evening, the aldermen made a few more important changes.

Alds. Scullard and Austin explained with regard to Chause 7, where the rates are mentioned, that the clause making special rates for Harrison Hall had been struck out, as the payment for the use of gas in this building would probably prove a bone of contention between the city and the county. The cost was taken off the gas to be furnished to other municipal buildings.

Ald. Potter was of the opinion that a clause should be inserted specifying that the company should keep the gas ja their mains up to a certain pressure.

Ald. Scullard suggested that some provision be made as to the quality of the gas supplied.

Mr. Coste, of the Symmes Company, who was present, explained that the quality of the gas could only be such as was supplied by the wells, but he stated that it was of as good quality as was used in other places. As to the pressure, it would be to the company's interests to see that this was satisfactory to their customers. The underwriters ruled that the pressure should not exceed eight onness.

Ald. Scullard then explained that the clause in the franchise in which the company agreed to supply 10,000,000 feet of gas free to the first five new industries locating in the city, in lieu of granting the gas company air exclusive franchise for five years, had to be struck out, as no exclusive franchise for five years, had to be struck out, as no exclusive franchise could be legally granted. He was very sorry on this account, as he believed free gas would be a great indusement for concerns to locate in Chatham. The advice bit the city solicitor had been taken on this matter and he had stated that such a provision would be illegal.

Ald. Austin also wanted more light on another clause. He said that the clause with reference to the rates to be charged did not state what interest would be charged in case bills were not paid promptly. He thought that a clause should be inserted stating that the company should not charge more than ten per cent, interest.

Mr. Coste objected to this on the grounds that no interest could be added legally; there must be a maximum rate, and reductions must be made from that for prompt payment.

Immediately the news of the disaster became known crowds of half-clad persons were rushing towards the mine, and there was heartrending scenes at

At daylight signals had been exchanged with the bottom seam, where a majority of the men were entombed, to the effect that they were safe, and with this message a sense of relief passed over the crowd of anxious relatives waiting at the mouth. As the morning advanced the bodies of dead men slowly were brought up. The first dead to appear were mostly old men who had been employed as shifters who had been employed as shifter; and stonemen.
