Midnight Mechanics Made a Neat Haul at Taylor & McKay's Last Night

Other Premises Were Also Entered-Mr. Atkinson's Premises Ransacked

Borglars were busy in the Maple

Girls' Fleece Lined Vests and drawers, extra serviceable quality, fine soft finish, all sizes, on sale City during last night. They apparently focussed their at tention on the popular liquor establishment of Taylor & McKay, where

their biggest haul was made. Entrance was effected by removing two panes of glass from the storm window of the store room which looks out into the alley behind, With a chisel or other sharp instrument the drawers of the desk were pried open and books and papers ransacked. The cash register was tapped and its contents, \$4.55 in silver and over \$1.50 in coppers, taken. Over a dozen quart bottles of Scotch and Irish whiskey were also included in the booty, and perhaps other case goods not yet located.

Crown Attorney Smith had charge of the prosecution, while ex-Ald. G. G. Martin appeared for the defence.

IPSWICH LIBERAL GAIN

Constituency Rejects Its Member For Twenty Years.

Voting Is Unusually Heavy-Three Liberals and One Conservative Returned Without Opposition-Twenty-Five Contests on fer To-day-Chamberlain Says This Will Not Be the Final Verdict-Unfair Play.

London, Jan. 13.—Ipswich was the first of the British contested elections polled yesterday, and resulted in the gain of a seat by the Liberal party. It was this dual constituency which gave the first decision against Mr. Gladstone's home rule bill, and during the last Parliament it was represented by last Parliament it was represented by Daniel Ford Coddar, Liberal, and Si Charles Dairymple, Conservative. Now the latter is turned down by Felix Cob oold, the second Liberal candidate, by

bold, the second Liberal candidate, by a large majority. Sir Charles Dalrymple, the unseated member, is a barrister and landowner, and was considered a good enough candidate in 1887 o be put up against Gladstone in the famous Midlothian campaign. He was defeated then, but

campaign. He was defeated then, but was elected for Ipswich in 1886, and has held the sent since.

The polling was unusually heavy, showing how deeply the country is stirred by the fiscal struggle. Motor cars played an important part in taking voters to and from the polls, and many persons are attributing the great success of the Liberals to their being better supplied with these vehicles better supplied with these vehicle than the Conservatives.

During the day three Liberal candidates and one Conservative were returned without opposition.

Twenty-five boroughs will poll today, including the six divisions of Manchester City. The constituency of Manchester East, is that represented by Mr. Balfour, whose opponent is T. G. Harridge, K.C. Winston Churchill, under secretary for the cofonles, is the candidate for Manchester Northwest, his opponent being W. Jaynson west, his opponent being W. Jaynson Hicks. It was represented in the last Parliament by Sir W. H. Houldsworth, Unionist, who retires.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 13.—The work men's council after consultation with the leaders of the other proletariat or-ganizations yesterday decided that the leaders of the other proletariat or-ganizations yesterday decided that the celebration of the anniversary of Jan. 22 ("Red Sunday") should take the form of a general pacific strike for a single day. Delegates were appointed to go to France, Germany and England, as well as other places abroad for the purpose of thanking the workers of those countries who propose to join in a general observance of the anni-versary.

Count Witte's secretary has telegraphed to Moscow contradicting a statement that the Caar would swear to observe the constitution. Twelve hundred frontier guards have been brought to St. Petersburg to strengthen the garrison. The Government forces continue to reconquer the southeastern part of the empire. Novorossisk has been recaptured after having been held by the insurgents for three weeks.
