A CONVICT'S ROMANCE

ODD WAY IN WHICH A LIFE PRISONER WON HIS FREEDOM.

The Story of the Construction of the Old Statehouse at Albany-The Price of a Genius Who Saw and Grasped His Opportunity.

Vouched for by the late Henry Smith, who said he learned the fact through being speaker of the assembly, there is an interesting bit of history connected with the old statehouse at Albany, where it has stood for years, the finest example of pure Doric architecture in this country, on the easterly side of Eagle street, between Pine and Steuben streets, its walls and partitions all of solid stone, very much as if its halls, rooms and stairs had been carved out

within a huge block of marble, It was completed in 1842, costing the state about \$350,000. It is built entirely of Sing Sing marble, quarried and cut

within the prison walls. The old capitol being inadequate to accommodate the increasing business of the state, this additional building was planned and built and is still used for the offices of the state comptroller, the state engineer and surveyor and the state banking department.

In a spirit of economy it was decided to have as much as possible of the work done by the prisoners from the material found within the prison walls at Sing Sing, fairly good material, too, but not the best, as it is a soft marble, as evidenced by the wear which now shows so plainly in the steps and by the crumbling of some of the stones from exposure to the weather. All the material was cut to completion within the walls of the prison under such plans that when shipped to Albany there would be no further work necessary except practically to lay one stone upon another, and so on until the whole was assembled in the completed build-

To accomplish this detailed plan a system of marking the stones was necessary. The plans were carefully made and a system of marking elaborately laid out by the architect in charge, who found in the prison at Sing Sing a life prisoner whose record showed him to be an engineer of the highest ability and who seemed as competent as any man in the country to carry out the work to be done in the prison, and naturally he was not unwilling to follow his chosen profession in preference to doing the manual labor of cutting or quarrying stone. So, following the spirit of economy referred to above, the plans in detail and the system of marking were turned over to him and the whole work at that end given over to his full superintendence and absolute

In due time the stones in their various shapes and sizes and in quantity for the whole building were delivered in Albany and the work of construc tion commenced in accordance with the plans and system of marking originally furnished. With the very first stone there was trouble. It not only did not fit the place, but none of the stones marked to adjoin it fitted it, and, fur-ther, it did not seem ever intended for the place the number indicated. Investigation brought out that the stones were not of the sizes or shapes specified and shown on the plans, and, as to the system of marking, it was quite evident that the stones brought together by it had no relation whatever to each other.

The bewildered architect hardly knew whether he was a candidate for the asylum or possibly for Sing Sing. Howover, a careful verification of his plans and his marking system proved their correctness, and the blame fell squarely upon the civil engineer, the life prisoner. He was questioned, taken severely to task and roundly rated for his incompetence and threatened and abused. He met it all calmly. "It looks to me like a mighty good joke on you fellows. Anyway it is the best joke I have heard

since I came to Sing Sing."

As to their continued threats he said:

"What can you do to a life prison-

Finally, in answer to the abuse and slurs as to his capabilities as an en-gineer, he said he had changed the plans both in dimension and shape where they had diverged from purity of style, and the system of marking he had changed altogether, but if they could find some one who understood his system the building would go up

P.'s Weekly recalls the introduction of the vehicle, and points out that London did not take kindly to the word "omnibus." "What is the plural?" people asked, and when Joseph Hume spoke in the House of Commons of omnibi there was the laughter called "much." The vehicles were long known as "shilliwas the laughter called "much." The vehicles were long known as "shillibeers." The first two shillibeers ran to the city by the New road, now the Marylebone, Euston and Pentonville roads. They were drawn by three horses abreast, and had conductors who had been with Shillibeer in Paris. When it became known that they were sons of naval officers the young ladies of Paddington used to ride as far as King's Cross in order to improve their French.

These shillibeers carried twenty-two passengers; the fare was a shilling. Newspapers and magazines were propassengers, the large provided—not without reason, since the journey was slow, and there was a long half-way halt. In this generosity Shillibeer was outdone by a later owner, Mr. Cloud, who ran omnibuses between the Haymarket and Chelsea. Cloud placed a small, well-chosen library in each of his omnibuses, so that be who rode might read the standard authors. Mr. Henry Charles Moore, whose history of "Omnibuses and Cabs" is admirably full, says that people rode to Hammersmith purposely to read these books. As they also stole them, this method of getting culture was not so expensive as it looks. The first Free Library was an omnibus.

THE NORDARCH TENTS

IMPROVED TENTS FOR HOUSING CONSUMPTION SUFFERERS.

Built With a Frame As Substantial As That of a Dwelling, They Are Models of Comfort, Will Withstand the Heaviest of Gales and Are Not Affected By Either Rain or Snow-Octagonal in Shape.

Never before in the history of the world has more attention been given than now to that dread disease, consumption. Never has the "tent treatment" been so widely used. This "tent treatment" is being given a thorough test in several places, notably in Colorado, where the climatic conditions are such that life out of doors is possible for most of the year.

The tents most in use are of the Nor-

The tents most in use are of the Nor-darch pattern, so called after a camp

of that name, where consumptives have been treated with marked success. In the Union Printers' Home of Colorado, where ten of these tents are in use, fully fifty per cent. of the patients have recovered health.

These tents are octagonal in shape, as this form has proved the best to resist wind. They are built with a framework as substantial as that of a house, the intersections reinforced

house, the intersections reinforced with castings, and every part so firmly anchored that they will withstand a wind of one hundred miles an hour. They are covered with the best double filled army canvas, which is not affect

filled army canvas, which is not aneced by snow or rain.

It is in the arrangement for ventilation that the chief virtue in these tents lies, for this is the all important factor in the outdoor treatment of tuberculosis. The tents have hardwood floors, built a few feet from the ground. Four trap doors, about a foot wide and four feet in length, are at the corners of the floor, and these can be opened or closed at pleasure, a wire screen forming a protection against bugs at the insects. Another ventilator is in the managed by a peak of the roof. This is managed by a

The tents are attractively furnished with a white iron bedstead, rugs, chairs and a built-in closet, bureau and

washstand. Those in Colorado Springs, which are considered models of their kind, are the only steam heated tents in the world. The first cost of the installation of this heating apparatus is expensive, but after the pipes are laid, the tents can be built for a little more than one hundred dollars each.

The diet of tuberculosis patients is raw eggs, milk and roast and boiled meats. Other foods are added as the appetite increases and there is better circulation of blood. In all cases, where the outdoor treatment is tried, there is no neglect of sanitary precaution, and care is exercised as much as if the patient were in a house or hospital. Sputum cups are used day and night and all clothing is disinfected.

Newspapers of the World.

Among European countries, accorsing to the Revue Hebdomadaire, Germany stands at the head with 5,500 newspapers of which 800 are dailies. England occupies second place with 3,000, 809 dailies. France has 2,819, of which, however, only one-quarter appear daily or two or three times a week. Italy publishes 1,400 newspapers, followed in their order by Austra-Hungary. Spain, Russia, Greece and Switzerland. The total number of newspapers published in Europe is about 20,000.

In Asia not less than 3,000 newspapers appear periodically, the largest number in Japan and the British Indies.

Africa has the smallest number of newspapers, only 200 dailies being published in the whole continent, of which thirty are published in Egypt, the balance in the European colonies. Newspapers published in the United States at the close of 1903 are given by Rowell's Directory as: Weeklies, 14,455; semiweeklies, 499; triweeklies, 54; dailies, 2,215; total newspapers, 17,223; total periodicals, 3,262; total newspapers and periodicals, 20,485. The daily and weekly newspapers published in the United States are in number nearly equal to the dailies and weeklies in all Europe.

THE GIANT INDIANS.

Peculiar Ways of the Onas of Tierre del Fuego.

The Onas, a tribe of Indians inhabiting the mainland of the Tierra def Fuego island, are physical giants. Their average height is over six feet. A few are six and one-half feet; a few fall below six feet. The women are more cor pulent and not so tall. There is no race in the world with a more perfect physical development than the Ona In-dians. This is partly due to the topography of the country and the distribu tion of the game, which makes long marches across the country a necessity.
In mentality they fall far below their physical attainments. In the past their

supply of game has been plentiful, and this may account for the lack of inventive genius among them. This lack of progressive skill is portrayed in their home life, clothing and homes. Their children suffer from it, for, contrary to the practice common among most In dians of feeding, dressing and training the children well, the Onas' little ones are mostly naked, poorly fed and alto-gether neglected. They have abundant material for supplying themselves with clothing and homes, and yet they throw a few branches together, put skins over the windward side and then shiver un-

ler the miserable shelter. Scientists who have made a study of the subject say that the language of the Onas is the strangest ever listened to. Many of the words are not difficult to pronounce, nor is the construction of the sentences difficult, but very few words are interrupted by a sound which it is impossible to produce. The speaker hacks, coughs and grunts, distorting his face in the most inhuman manner, and then passes on to the next stumbling block. The Onas live principally upon meat, which in former years obtained from the guanaco.
