Railway Improvement.

With the completion and opening of the long talked of line of railway connecting Digby and Annapolis a new era in railroading in the western counties is entered upon. We now have an uninterrupted line of railway from Halifax to Yarmouth, and thus those two foremost towns of our Province are brought within easy access of each other. This much talked of and anxiously awaited for "missing link" between Annapolis and Digby embraces twenty miles of the most picturesque road in Nova Scotia, and was formally opened for public travel on Monday of this week. The opening of the Digby link has been seized upon by the management of the W. & A. railway as an opportunity of improved facilities on travel, and their new fast train will be put on next week. This train, of which we have heard so much, will run four days a week (on Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday) each way over the W. & A. railway; and connecting at Annapolis with the trains of the W. C. railway will considerably lessen the time between Halifax and Yarmouth. This train stops only at Middleton (dining room) Kentville, Wolfville, Windsor and Windsor Junction. Passengers for other points between Annapolis and Halifax will take the local express which stops at all stations. We congratulate the W. & A. railway on their enterprise and trust that their efforts to provide better railway accommodation may meet with the hearty support and appreciation of the travelling public.

Ordination.

A council of delegates from neighboring churches was called on Wednesday by the Wolfville Baptist church, to ordain Mr. Howard Bars, to the Christian ministry. At the meeting of the council in the afternoon, over which Rev. M. P. Freeman presided, Mr. Bars underwent a thorough doctrinal examination. The result being satisfactory, it was decided to proceed with the ordination in the evening. An ample tea was served by the ladies of the church to those present at the afternoon session.

The service was well conducted, the sermon and other addresses carefully prepared and delivered, and the music better than usual. Handsome bequests were placed on tables at each end of the platform.

Mr. Howard Bars is a son of J. W. Bars, Esq., of Wolfville, and a graduate of Acadia College, and of New- ton Theological Institution. He, with his wife, will sail in September for India, under the direction of the Maritime Mission Board. They will spend the first year at Calcutta, and the Madras Presidency, learning the Telugu language; and after that proceed to their own station.

Dr. Allison has accepted the presidency of Mt. Allison and tendered his resignation as superintendent of education in Nova Scotia, to take effect Oct. 31st. Dr. Allison is eminently qualified for the position as head of Mt. Allison, and is probably the best available man. His retirement from the position as superintendent of education of the Province is a provincial loss, and the government will find it difficult to find as his successor a man of equal ability, wisdom and integrity.

We would again impress upon the rate-payers of this county the importance of having their names properly registered upon the voters' list. The time for placing voters' names upon the list has been extended to August 15th, and a further opportunity is thus given. Those who do not take advantage of this chance should not complain if when an election again comes on they find themselves disqualified from voting.

The calendar of Dalhousie College for 1891-2 has just been issued, giving full information regarding the courses of study and the regulations and progress of the university. During the last collegiate year 220 students were in attendance, of whom eight were prosecuting their studies in more than one faculty; in arts, 146; in law, 60; in medicine, 31.

Resources of Nova Scotia.

Nova Scotia is marvellously rich in natural resources. Within its limits there are more valuable minerals by far than are known in any other territory of equal size—coal, gold, iron, manganese, antimony, marble, gypsum, limestone and sandstone being found in great abundance. There is scarcely a county in the province from one end to the other in which valuable deposits of one or more of these deposits do not exist. The extensive forests afford the best facilities for profitable lumbering and ship-building; its rivers, lakes and coast waters teem with fish; its fertile valleys, productive mountain slopes, and inexhaustible marshes are adapted to every variety of agriculture, and its equable insular climate, free from all extremes of heat and cold, of wet and drought, is surpassed by that of a few countries in the world. The land on which the New Englanders settled, and of which large tracts were freely given them, consisted of the famous dikes of the centre of the province, together with many acres of agricultural and fruit growing country as far as the world, stretching eastward and westward between the adjacent mountain ranges, in a soft, ever-changing, luxuriant landscape, on which almost uninterruptedly, clear, blue skies look down. The New England people who first settled in this charming region have transmitted to their descendants solid moral qualities and a high degree of intelligence. In education the county of Kings is foremost, and I know no part of the continent where purer, I have almost said so pure, English is spoken, or so few solidisms in speech are heard.—From Acadia Sketches in Harper's Bazar.

To Boom Nova Scotia.

On Tuesday, Aug. 4th, a party of about thirty American newspaper men, guests of the Yarmouth Steamship Co., and the Western Counties, Windsor & Annapolis, Nova Scotia Central and the Cornwallis Valley Railways, will leave Boston on the steamer Yarmouth, for a week's trip through this Province, and an inspection of the new railway connection between Digby and Annapolis. They will be in charge of Mr. Thomas F. Anderson, of the Boston Globe, press agent of the Yarmouth Steamship Co., and will tarry for a while in Wolfville, to enjoy its beauties. The itinerary of the party is as follows:—

TUESDAY, Aug. 4, 1891, leave Boston. WEDNESDAY, Drive through Yarmouth, inspect industries, etc.; leave at 1 p. m. by special train for Digby, drive through town; stop over night.

THURSDAY, Special train to Annapolis, drive through town (dinner); leave Annapolis by regular train for Kentville (lunch at station); take Cornwallis Valley train for Kingsport, return by special to Kentville; stop over night.

FRIDAY, Drive through Kentville, special to Wolfville; visit Colleges, etc. (dinner); proceed by special to Grand Pre, the home of Evangeline; thence by special to Windsor, drive through town, visit Kings College and Clifton the late residence of Judge Halliburton (Sam Slick); take 4.55 p. m. for Halifax.

SATURDAY, At Halifax, drive in forenoon, visit Public Gardens, etc., in afternoon.

SUNDAY, Rest and go to church.

MONDAY, Leave Halifax 8.30 a. m. for Middleton, then to Bridgewater; stop over night.

TUESDAY, Leave Bridgewater 7 a. m. homeward bound.

Kentville News.

Hon. J. W. Longley was in Kentville last week. The leading men in both political parties have been quite diligent in hunting up new names to put on the voters' list. If we have another election in this county before another year, about one thousand young men who never made use of the franchise will cast their first votes.

The Kentville boys are quite jubilant since their recent victory over the Berwick baseball club. The score of 30 to 6 shows that the Berwick boys were badly rattled.

Mr. H. S. Dodge opened up a large assortment of goods last week. He is always abreast of the times and has one of the best stores in town.

B. Webster, Esq., Q. C., was in Halifax on Monday attending Chambers before Judge Townsend.

On Tuesday night a colored man from the Pine Woods drove into Kentville, and was either intoxicated when he arrived or approached that state soon afterwards. He had some difficulty with his horse which attracted a crowd, and the policeman after rendering him assistance asked him to move out of town as he was creating a disturbance and blocking up the streets. The man became very nancy and refused to go, so he was taken in charge and carried to the police station. Next morning he was fined \$2.00 only, this being his first offence.

The King's County Election Case.

An application was made yesterday to Mr. Justice Ritchie, the judge to whom has been allocated the trial of the King's county controverted election, by Mr. Boak on behalf of the petitioner, for an order fixing the time and place for the trial of the petition. It was urged by Mr. Boake, on behalf of the respondent that as an appeal was outstanding, and as the presence of the respondent would be necessary at the trial, the application should be allowed to stand and come up at a later date. It was finally decided to fix the time for the trial as the 27th of October next ensuing, with the understanding that, if the pending appeal to the supreme court had not previously been disposed of, the time for the commencement of the trial would be further enlarged.—Herald of Wednesday.

From India.

I suppose that there are few readers of the ACADIAN who have not read or heard of the Indian jugglers. I hoped in coming to this country to be able to investigate this subject to some extent; but thus far have only had one opportunity of seeing the peculiar performances of this peculiar class of people. The compound has been overrun with bear and snake exhibitors and acrobatic performers; but only one company of jugglers, has visited us, and these were evidently not first class. We respectfully, but firmly and indiscriminately, request the bear and snake men to "git" as soon as their presence is known. One party of acrobats was allowed to exhibit, and it was certainly an astonishing performance. One rather unsatisfactory result of this affair was the attempt on the part of our two youngsters, to imitate what they had been watching with supreme interest, at the risk of cracked necks and broken limbs. The jugglers began their entertainment by extracting a couple of rapers (a coin the same size as the Canadian half dollar) from each other's noses, and swallowing big marbles by the dozen, which they apparently were able to squeeze into their mouths with great difficulty. After several amusing tricks of this sort, they placed an oblong basket on the floor before us that would hold about a bushel and a half, and binding one of their number in a sitting position in such a way that it looked to be impossible for him to move a muscle, placed him face downwards in the basket, and in that position he more than filled. They then spread a cloth over him and placed the basket cover on top. In a short time simultaneously with loud thumps on their drums and the shrill screams of their wind musical instruments, one side of the cloth was thrown violently upward and the rope, which had been on the imprisoned man and which had been marked, flew out at our feet. One of the performers seemed to get angry at this, and in the midst of a babel of noise, sprang at the basket, jerked the cloth away, jammed the cover over tightly and bound it securely with the rope. This seemed to be satisfactory to the whole party, for they sat down in a row between the basket and the door and indulged in their peculiar music for a minute or two. The manager then sprang to his feet and grasping a long, sharp-pointed stick, ran it through and through the basket, and punched it savagely into the corners. He then untied the rope and removed the cover but replaced the cloth, and jumped on the cloth into the basket, and finally squeezed himself down into the basket, leaving no doubt in our minds that he was the only man in it. At this everybody was intensely astonished, and the juggler began a sort of a war-dance about the basket, ending up with a deafening racket. The manager then pulled the cloth away again, replaced the cover and rebound it with the rope, and stepped forward with a very low salutation to receive our offerings, after which the missing man would be produced. It looked as though he had a big job on his hands worth at least a rupee. I placed that coin in his palm, and with great effect the cover of the basket was again removed, the cover taken off and there was the man, a tight fit in the basket and as fresh as a daisy. This performance took place in a small room just inside of the door, in which a group of natives belonging to the compound was standing, and as mystified spectators as ourselves. We were sitting in a semi circle within 4 feet of the basket, and thought we saw every move on the part of the performers, but could not detect the trick. We hear stories of these fakirs performing almost supernatural feats, burying their heads in the sand up to their shoulders, and remaining in that position for several hours with no apparent bad results when they choose to resume normal condition, climbing up into space on a rope which has no visible hold on anything stationary, and others just as unexplainable by the onlooker.

Another class of men in this country with far less reason for it, wield a far more potent influence over the natives than the jugglers do. They are astrologers, and seem to exercise their art in the same way and for the same purposes as did the wise men of Babylon, and in later times, of Rome. At any birth an astrologer is called in, who professes to be able to discover from his package of Palmistry leaf books, the manipulation of some sacred ashes, and the state of the planets, the fact whether the child has come to town under a lucky star or not. If he is forced to give an adverse decision he is able, for a consideration, to inform the unhappy parents how to avoid most of the impending ill. Marriages are solemnized only after the family astrologer has set the day. For some reason, which I have as yet been unable to discover, May is the favorite month for weddings, although the natives confess that on account of the intense heat during that month it is the most inconvenient of the whole twelve for their huge marriage parties. My mullah says that his family astrologer is the best in the Madras Presidency. How true this may be I am not prepared to question; but I am of him that he set the day (May 18th) this year for 500 weddings in Vindyanagar alone. If that number of marriages should be solemnized on one day in Halifax, with perhaps 15,000 more population than this city, it would create something of a sensation, and the man who would undertake to shoulder the responsibility this astrologer assumed, would be considered in truth a brave man.

United States News.

Mr. Secretary Blaine is still at Bar Harbor. The reports regarding the Secretary's health are conflicting. Mrs. James Brown Potter, the actress, lately divorced by her husband, is reported to have married Mr. Kyrle Bellew, the actor, at San Francisco.

A portrait of Mr. Phil Armour leading a pig by a string appeared recently in the New York papers. According to recent published statistics the Armour firm is far ahead of all others as buyers of beef. The statistics show a diminution in the number of cattle and sheep and a large increase in the number of hogs. The wife of a well-to-do farmer in Indiana has broken the record by giving birth to ten children within twenty-nine months. The mother and all the children are reported as doing nicely—two triplets and two sets of twins.

KANSAS CITY.—Summer complaints are prevalent, quite a number of children have succumbed to cholera infantum. Where a doctor is not at once available it is recommended to place a flannel bander steeped in whiskey round the sufferer's abdomen, and to administer whites of eggs beaten up with brandy and cinnamon.

According to a London letter, in a recent portrait of the Prince of Wales, a gold bracelet on the left hand is made quite a prominent feature.

Mr. W. H. Gladstone, son of the ex-premier, whose death took place in London during the first week in this month, sank under an operation for the removal of a tumor in the brain. He had been a great sufferer for three years and was partially paralyzed on the right side. In Kansas City, Mo., seventy-five saloons failed to renew their licenses on the 1st July, causing a loss to the city revenue of \$64,500. There are plenty still running. An effort is being made by the church party to put a stop to the Sunday base-ball and races at the exposition, and to other Sunday amusements.

New appliances for the safety and convenience of the public are being introduced on the W. & A. R. Last week an electric semaphore was put in on the line of the W. & A. R. near the "Missing Link" junction at Annapolis. The semaphore is about three quarters of a mile from the Annapolis station from which it is operated. It goes out far enough beyond the junction to guard W. & A. R. trains coming to Annapolis. The semaphore is of the most approved modern pattern, operated by 22 cells, and is mounted on a post 30 feet long with 25 feet above ground. Another semaphore will be erected a short distance from the other one, but on the Digby and Annapolis line.—Herald Chronicle.
