

Nova Scotia Exhibition for 1904.

IT WILL OPEN ON SEPTEMBER 7TH AND CONTINUE TILL SEPT. 14TH.

The Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition and Industrial Fair is now in its eighth year, and on September 7th its gates will open to remain so until the 14th.

The Exhibitions of that year were generally voted a good one, but the management are not satisfied with what has been accomplished. They aim to attain yet greater things. Nova Scotia with its intelligent population of 500,000—these Maritime Provinces with their one million people—can support a great Exhibition, and year by year the endeavor has been, and will be, to make it greater and yet greater.

Several new features are to be introduced at the coming Exhibition. One of these will be a Domestic Department, conducted under the auspices of the National Council of Women, with a daily program and short talks on subjects, such as the Care of the Sick, Home Hints for Mothers, and Industrial Occupations for Women, etc. Bee-keeping, poultry-keeping, dairying, etc.

The Prize List has been carefully revised and shows \$25,000 for premiums and attractions, and liberal allowance for a magnificent exhibit of live stock, and the products of the farms and orchards of Nova Scotia. The Dominion Department of Agriculture will send a corps of judges, who will award the prizes, and who will also lecture on livestock and farming topics.

In the main building will be furnished a grand panoramic view of the manufactures of the province.

In its amusement features the 1904 Exhibition will be unsurpassed. At the Fair, the people of Nova Scotia will be given the opportunity for a grand holiday. First, will be the horse races, for which \$4,800 are offered in prizes, twelve races (two daily) with purses aggregating \$400 for each race. The opening day will be devoted to the horse show, on the six following days there will be a long programme of special attractions which have been secured by Manager Wood, and it is expected, with the kind assistance of Major General Parsons and Vice-Admiral Douglas, a grand military and naval spectacle will be produced, which will outshine anything in the past.

Marine Insurance on Apple Cargoes.

Some months ago an article appeared in which it was stated that the rate of marine insurance on apples between Halifax and Great Britain, appeared to be running on a sliding scale, taking in the wide range of eight-tenths—one and half and three cents per lb. In some cases where double insurance had been charged it had swelled to four and half cents per lb.

In the latter instance, probably the London firms anxious to get their pickings out of the guileless shipper had become through custom to regard the transaction as a legitimate steal.

While the excessive rates paid during the past year has taken many thousands of dollars from the fruit industry of the valley, still a far more important phase of the insurance question is to have a clause inserted in the policy, whereby another Evangeline affair with a loss of \$20,000 and more recently a Gulf of Annapolis with a \$40,000 loss, can be avoided.

One of the greatest risks of the Fruit Industry is while in transit across the ocean. No matter how well equipped a steamer may be there is always a risk of derangement of machinery or starting gear, more particularly on the route between Halifax and the British channels, crossing as they do the ice region of the late winter or early spring months.

It is surprising how little interest the average fruit growers have taken in the insurance on their apples. Ask of anyone, not excepting the bulk of the speculators if their apples are insured and they will tell you they guess so, but do not know upon what conditions—until a boat fetches up at the Azores or what is worse the owners demand freight on an unsalable cargo landed at London.

As we have said before if a "break down," etc., clause is not included in the fish shippers had better cease sending good money after bad and let the insurance companies go to Jericho. Fortunately there is no reason to suppose such extreme action is necessary.

If it had been a man, it would have been dashed to pieces on the rocks. Many times it sometimes fell to be whirled upside down and came over, spread his wings, and rose and rose and rose, until he was a speck in the sky. Like the sea-bird, so are the sons of God. On the winds of hope and faith, we mean to rise, be glad of your conflicts. Fight the good fight of faith. You have won your victory when you have assumed that they that be with you are more than they that be against you. As George Macdonald says, in Robert Falconer, 'This is the real practical, working-faith.'

Punishing Drunkards. The National Temperance Advocate contains the following information concerning methods of dealing with the offence of drunkenness in different countries from which it will be noticed that civilization is much more tolerant of this offence than are countries that we are apt to look upon as comparatively backward in the march of progress. In this country \$2 and costs. In Persia 50 lashes on the soles of the feet. In Turkey the bastinado to a more severe extent. In Albania death. In the three latter instances the extreme penalty is given above. Before the officials give a man up as confirmed in his cups they lecture him. In Persia they put him on the black-list and forbid him, the bazars except in certain hours, and then under police supervision, and also places of amusement and worship.

In Turkey the offender receives an admonition and is fined for the first offence, and the bastinado is applied afterward if the crime be repeated. Among the mountaineers of Albania and Montenegro drunkenness is regarded as a political offence and for that reason is considered more serious than if it were a moral one. Among the mountaineers fighting and drinking are not considered to go together, and to be able to fight is the first duty of a citizen. Therefore the drunkard is harshly dealt with. At first they try moral suasion with the festive tippler, but when that fails he persists in making the mountain peaks ring to his Montenegro substitute for 'We won't go home till morning!' he is declared to be a danger and a disgrace to his tribe and his country and is quietly assassinated by the local chief.

RUSSIA.—The Russian Government within recent years, became so thoroughly aroused in regard to the curse of drink, that within the last few years it has expended millions of dollars in establishing tea and temperance houses, and trying, if possible to win the people from drunkenness.

FRANCE.—The French Government has of late become wonderfully aroused to the evils of alcoholism. Posters are displayed in every community setting forth the danger of indulgence therein. We have only space for a single extract from this magnificent manifesto: 'Alcoholism is one of the most terrible plagues and barriers to the individual health, the existence of the home and the progress and prosperity of the nation.'
