Confused.

To the Editor of THE ACADIAN:
Mr. Editor.—I am somewhat confused. I have heard the evangelical clergymen of this town pray from the pulpit and elsewhere for almost everything and everybody, but I have never heard even a faint hint in behalf of the Premier of Canada. He certainly has had a most strenuous load upon his back for many moons, in fact for nearly three years, and if these eloquent and spiritually minded pulpit speakers believe in prayer and in its efficaciousness, why not once in an age remember the able, strong, dominating Christian gentleman who is Prime Minister of Canada. It is true that we have heard prayers on behalf of President Wilson, Lloyd George, King George, and in fact almost every one else, but not a word for our Premier. He has not, by a stroke of the pen, been able to set up prohibition in Canada, neither has the peerless leader, Lloyd George, been able to produce it in Great Britain, or President Wilson in the United States. In Canada it would be easy if it were not for the very strong opposition from Quebec, where the French-Canadians and the clergy are almost unanimously opposed to prohibition. Sir Robert Borden, our Premier, is trying to keep faith with those brave heroes who are overseas, fighting and dying for us who are still in Canada. A Canadian poet, who is fighting over in Flanders, has written these beautiful lines:
"If ye break faith with us who die,
We shall of sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders' Field."

Beneath the crosses erected amongst the poppies of Flanders' fields lie some of the men from this country. Yes, and from this town—too many I am sorry to say—and I regret the lines of this Canadian soldier, written on the field of battle, as a direct appeal to every able man in Canada. This is the object of the new Conscription Bill that Premier Borden has presented to Parliament; and notwithstanding the absence of the public prayers of our clergymen for wisdom and success, he is laying a wonderful outburst of support from Liberals as well as Conservatives in Parliament. Politics, in this great national crisis is being cast to the wind. French-Canadians are holding back and saying many nasty things; but what of it?

If the Premier had not been a man of great force and honesty of purpose, he might easily have shrunk from the Quebec opposition; but not he. No man in all the Empire's extent is more deserving of love and Christian support than our brave leader.
