

## BRIDGE OPENING DEFERRED

(Edmundston Observer)  
There has been some doubt in the minds of the Committee appointed by the Board of Trade and the Town Council in regard to the opening of the New International Bridge, as to whether the structure would be completed by the first of July. The engineer in charge felt sure that the bridge would be finished in ample time, and the Board of Trade received assurance from Ottawa that this would be the case. On Saturday the President of the Board and others proceeded to Madawaska to interview the selectmen and others in regard to the arrangements for the celebration and to see for themselves how the work was progressing. They report that there is a disagreement amongst the people of Madawaska as to the road approaching the bridge, some wanting it one way and some thinking that another way is best. The Public Utilities, and Highway Commission sent representatives to consult with the people in regard to this matter last week, but the meeting adjourned without any decision being reached, and this will in itself probably make some delay in the original arrangements. But further the bridge engineer on the American side was interviewed, and he reports that up until the present no lumber has arrived and that he has had reported to him only one carload of lumber as having been shipped. As several carloads will be required it seems impossible now, even if the road approaching the bridge on the American side was finished. It is then a foregone conclusion that there will be no bridge opening on the first of July. But the celebration later in the summer will be all the greater, and better by reason of the delay.

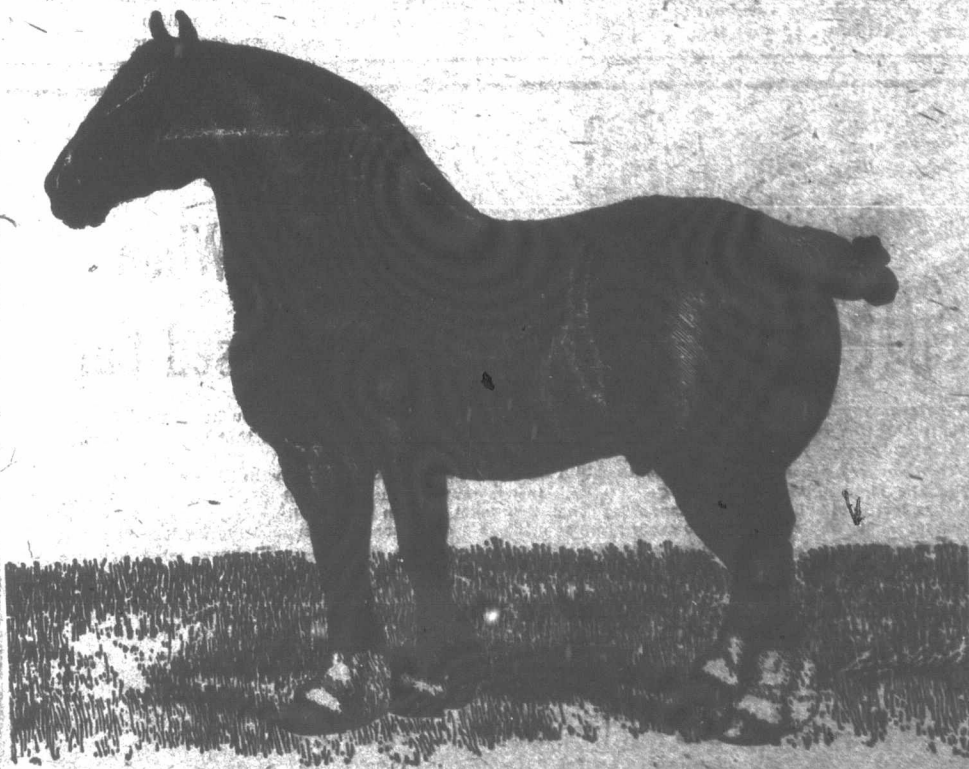
