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VICTORIA CO. IS ORGANIZING

A meeting was held at the Curless Hotel, Grand Falls, on Monday evening for the purpose of organizing Victoria county for the Victory Loan campaign. All parts of the county were represented. At 9 o'clock the men interested, numbering about fifty, sat down to supper, served in Mr. Stewart's best style, and strictly within war regulations. After doing justice to the excellent meal, a business meeting was held, at which Dr. B. A. Puddington, county chairman, presided. The provincial secretary, S. A. Thomas, was introduced and explained in detail the plan of campaign as outlined by the provincial committee. Rev. Father Joyner addressed the meeting in his usual interesting and forceful manner, and his words were highly appreciated by all present. Rev. Charles Flemington, of Andover, also gave a short and powerful address. Discussions as to the best methods of canvassing the county in the sale of Victory bonds followed, and were taken part in by several of the gentlemen present. On motion of T. J. Carter, seconded by A. J. Jensen, it was decided to hold meetings in all school houses in the county; to ask canvassers to call on practically every man and woman in their respective canvassing districts; to ask ladies to assist in the campaign.

A vote of thanks was tendered Dr. Puddington for the very efficient manner in which he conducted the proceedings. The meeting closed with the singing of the National Anthem.

Another meeting to make arrangements and organize the town was held in the town hall on Wednesday evening. Dr. Puddington called the meeting to order and a goodly number of the business men was present. The following were elected an executive committee: Matthew Burgess, D. J. Collins, F. B. Wilson, H. E. NEW STEEL BRIDGE FOR HARTLAND

It is the evident intention of the Foster government to rebuild the bridge across the St. John at Hartland, using steel and concrete in the work. The need of the bridge has been pressed home upon the Department of Public Works by Superintendent Campbell and A. D. McCain. The public has been given very little information concerning the matter, which is in striking comparison to the bridge bombast given out by former governments. Many an election has been run with Hartland bridge as the local issue, but with the present government "business is business" and this week preliminary soundings are being made for new piers. The building of such a bridge is a big job and department engineers will be busied through the winter preparing the plans and specifications. It is expected contracts for the piers will be let so the construction of them can commence at first low water.

John Osborne Flanders
