THE MINERS' STRIKE AT SPRING

HILL. The strike at the Spring Hill (Cumber-

Hitherto only the coal cutters and soal handlers have been on strike; the pumpmen, firemen and engineers have kept at work and so have kept the mine free of water and the property in sife condition. But now the strikers have called out these men and they ceased work to-night. The calling out of the ampuen and engineers is said to be imprecedented in the history of strikes. means the destruction of the mine. The strike has lasted nine weeks. That means \$90,000, That is the sum lost. Bysides that, the men have either spent the money they saved or have been compelled to run head over ears in debt to sustain themselves and families during the strike. The withdrawal of so much money from circulation naturally demoralized business and many merchants have been compelled to ask for an extension. The loss to the company has also been very great. They have lost the sale of 100,-18-bk. Capenhurst, Jones, Liverpool, D. & 000 tons of coal which would have been mined during the two months of the strike; they have lost some large contracts that would have kept the mine running full time for some months to come; and half of the employes, including the ajority of the best men have left Springhill and gone to other mining centres.

The strike has been disastrous to all parties.
