BERLIN ELECTIONS.

Allen Huber Now Mayor—Reeve and Deputies.
Berlin, Ont., Feb. 26.—The new municipal election held here yesterday was a very exciting contest. Allen Huber, who was defeated for Mayor at the election in January by four votes, was elected Mayor yesterday by 197 majority.

MURDERED HIM.

Arrested in Wisconsin Charged With Murdering a Canadian.
Brookville, Ont., Feb. 26.—News has just been received here of the murder at a little place called Fance, twenty miles from Florence, Wis., on Feb. 3, of Patrick Campbell, a former resident of this town, who went to Wisconsin twenty-five years ago. Campbell, who was 52 years old, unmarried, and resided alone on a farm of forty acres, was found dying in his log hut, with a shot-gun wound in his body. He died on being taken to a hospital. From a description given, the authorities arrested Paul Kaan, a Pole, to whom Campbell earlier in the evening had refused a night's lodging. Frank Campbell, of Toronto, is a brother, and Michael Campbell, of this town, is another brother. Two sisters reside in Denver.

JAP AND CHINESE

Engaged in a Guerrilla War in Manchuria.
Portland, Ore., Feb. 26.—Advices have been received in Portland from Hong Kong and other Chinese cities that a species of a guerrilla warfare has broken out in Manchuria between the Japanese soldiers who guard the railway occupation and the native Chinese, who are bent on driving out of the country the representatives of the power whom they fear as an encroaching menace.
It is said in these advices that several conflicts have already occurred between the soldiers and the people, and that the Japanese have been driven entirely from the towns of Hop Gi Bin and En Tai Ho Pui.
The fact that trouble exists between their country and Japan is well known to well informed Chinese of this city, and all look upon the situation as serious, some of them even saying that a long and bitter struggle has begun.

HABITUAL TREATING.

Toronto, Feb. 26.—Under the New Election Bill now before the Legislature habitual treating is to be made a criminal offence. In a case some years ago in which an attempt was made to unseat Dr. Routledge, the member elect for East Middlesex, the court held that as Dr. Routledge was in the habit of treating before he became a candidate his continuance in the habit afterwards did not constitute a criminal offence. The proposed change in the law is to be the first of this kind.

WANT TO SELL WOOD.

Ottawa, Ont., Feb. 26.—As a result of the Indian Council held at Congny Reserve near Maniwaki, the Algonquins of that section have asked the Government that they may be allowed to cut wood to sell and for more land to each family, but above all the right to kill fur bearing animals at all seasons.

TO SAVE ANOTHER.

Montreal, Feb. 26.—A criminal's desire to save an innocent man prompted Geo. Pigeon to confess to two lawyers yesterday afternoon at St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary that he, and not Hobson, a Syrian Court House interpreter, stole \$1,700 from a Court House safe in December last.

WANT BONUS.

Montreal, Feb. 26.—Montreal longshoremen have taken seventy actions owing to failure to pay them the bonus of two and a half cents awarded them last summer, when the rates were raised from twenty-five to twenty-seven cents.

DEPORTING LUNATICS.

Toronto, Feb. 26.—During the present week the Government have deported three male and one female lunatics to England and one male to Russia, from Ontario.

U. S. AUTO.

Fort Wayne, Ind., Feb. 26.—The American car in the New York to Paris automobile race arrived at Kendaalville early today. Compensation to Workmen.

The Workmen's Compensation Act, 1906, which has been in force in Great Britain since the first of last July, is producing some interesting decisions in the law courts. One of these was rendered the other day in the case of an employee of a coal company. He left off work one Saturday morning at 5 o'clock. At noon he went for his wages, using a footpath made by his employers to give access to the works. While doing so he was struck by a passing train and injured. The county court judge declared that the employer was liable, but the Court of Appeals reversed the judgment, holding that it was a part of the contract of employment to require the employee to pass along that dangerous route to obtain his wages. Therefore the accident made the employer liable as if the accident had happened in the course of the man's daily employment, and entitled him to compensation. Other decisions of the Court of Appeals have maintained that mere negligence on the part of the employer is no bar to compensation, though "serious and wilful misconduct" has been declared to relieve the employer from liability. Even this, under the act, is not a bar to compensation when death results. As a result of the law and its liberal interpretation by the courts the insurance companies are doing a rushing business, for every employer must insure or take the risk himself.—Montreal Gazette.
