They blame illegal fishing and trust that the reports made by them will bear results, so when they return next season there will be better fishing. They had been on the Half Moon for salmon. They report that poachers have been u ing dynamite, nets and spears in killing salmon. They caught salmon with the fly and the fish showed the marks of the spear on them. Rocky Brook was another place where they had observed illegal fishing going on . The sports men state that they have concrete evidence of net fishing at night three occasions.
