The Opposition Triumph.

The noble fight put up by Mr. Borden, Leader of the Opposition and his followers in the House of Commons, has been crowned with success, and the bare-faced attempt of the Government to disfranchise the Conservatives of Manitoba has been frustrated. The Opposition fought this bill in the interests of justice and fair play, and in the struggle they had at their back all the right thinking people of Canada. In this fight the Opposition have done nobly and well and have earned the everlasting gratitude of those who sent them to Parliament.

On Thursday last the Minister of Justice announced in the Commons that the Government had agreed, so far as clause one of the bill was concerned at least, to accept the principle for which the Opposition have been contending. Clause one referred to Manitoba, and empowered the Federal Government to frame new lists after the writs for a Dominion election would issue. This clause is struck out and in its stead is incorporated a clause setting forth that the Judges of the Province shall allocate in Federal ridings the names of voters on the Provincial lists. This means that where the boundaries of Federal constituencies do not coincide with those of Provincial ridings, the Judges shall determine in what subdivision an elector may vote. All electors may be heard at the time this distribution is made by the Judges. This is the proposition assented to by Mr. Borden. The provisions relating to British Columbia and the unorganized districts of Quebec are cut out altogether; but the bill retains the power to prepare new lists for New Ontario. This provision will be fought in committee by Mr. Borden and the Opposition.

From this summary it will be seen that almost all the amendments demanded by the Opposition have been conceded, and the back down of the Government is a splendid triumph for the Opposition. Mr. Aylesworth, Minister of Justice, consumed three hours in his speech announcing the Government back-down, and quite plainly intimated that his change of front was in deference to the desire of his leader rather than from his own good will. As a matter of fact his changed attitude was a species of political gaul and wormwood. "In proposing that substitute for the Province of Manitoba," said Mr. Aylesworth, "I am not losing sight of the fact that it is a substantial departure from the clause of the bill which provides the work of preparing the lists shall be done by men appointed by this Government, by men who would be the friends of this Government. That feature is entirely eliminated simply because I adhere to the proposition made by my honored leader." This showed that Mr. Aylesworth yielded to pressure. He assumed full responsibility for the preparation of the bill, and evidently stubbornly persisted in his desire to have it enacted as first presented, but was overborne by Laurier. This is further affirmed by him when speaking of Mr. Borden's proposal to ask the judges to allocate the names. Mr. Aylesworth said, "The leader of the house closed with that proposition, he did so as he said after consideration, after consultation and he did so, so far as I am concerned, with my full consent whether that consent proceeded upon conviction or upon persuasion of my honored leader does not signify."
