The 9th of June.

To-morrow is the anniversary of the oth of June, the day on which in the year 1846 the city of St. John's was wiped out by fire. The fire began in the shop of a cabinet maker, situated just west of Queen Street, and originated from the boiling over of a glue pot on a stove. A gale of westerly wind blew and the fire, which started shortly after 9 o'clock in the morning, soon had the whole city in its embrace. The destruction of the city was complete by an early hour that night. Two soldiers of the regiments then stationed here lost their lives while trying to blow up buildings on Water Street to create fire breaks. The city from Riverhead to Maggoty Cove was destroyed, and old esidents of the city can give many thrilling reminiscences of that ter-
