"He" Says Kendall of Crippen Plan to Escape.

ment with the quartermaster in the S. S. Montrose to hide, among the cargo of that vessel, when, nearing port is characterized by all four quartermasters on the vessel as an absolute lie.

The S. S. Montrose arrived in the port of Montreal last evening and today Captain Kendall was seen by a Star representative regarding the allegations made by the defence during the trial.

"The first we knew about the trial," said Captain Kendall was what we read in the Star after we got into port last evening.

The quartermasters were very indignant when they read the statement made by the defence to the effect that Dr. Crippen's preparations for suicide were part of the scheme to hood-

wink justice, and that he had entered into an arrangement with one of them to be hidden among the cargo on hearing party leaving behind letters which would give the impression that he had committed suicide.

"They at once came to me in a body to deny all knowledge of such a plot. Not content with that, they have drawn up a sworn statement to the effect that Crippen's allegation is a concoction from the beginning, and that they not only never entered into such a conspiracy, but that such a thing was never even suggested to them, or thought of by them. That statement they signed, and it is now in my possession.—Oct. 28th.

Cable News.

HAVANA, Nov. 3.
Fairly complete election returns indicate that the Liberals will control the next Congress, although the Conservatives have made gains. According to the returns received, 12 Conservatives and 21 Liberal Congressmen have been elected. Nine seats are uncertain, but of these six probably will be Liberal.

PARIS, Nov. 3.
A special despatch from Madrid says: The Military Governor of Madrid has ordered the immediate release of Prof. Ovejero of the University, who was arrested recently as being identified with the anti-military campaign. This action follows a decision rendered by a military judge before whom Ovejero came for trial. The judge declared that Ovejero had not extolled the virtues of the army.

CHICAGO, Ills., Nov. 3.
Several of the oldest traditions of Frankford were shattered last night by James Eads Howe, the "millionaire hobo" and national organizer of the Brotherhood Welfare Association. In an address before the members of the local branch of the organization he advocated shower baths, fumigation, work for the unemployed, and "cushions" to ride on. Howe reported the Association to be flourishing in St. Louis, Kansas City, Cincinnati and New York. He accorded unanimous vote to a resolution to appoint a committee to confer with railroad presidents regarding free transportation for the passenger coaches to hoboes en route to places where labor is in demand. The committee also was empowered to start a movement toward a national free employment bureau.

CHICAGO, Ills., Nov. 3.
Ninety heads of departments of the Postal Telegraph Company in Chicago will form the largest single opera party at the opening performance at the Auditorium Theatre to-night. They will be the guests of Clarence H. Mackay, President of the Postal Telegraphs Co., who also is Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Chicago Grand Opera Co. Mr. Mackay wired to the Chicago management yesterday from New York requesting that a block of 100 seats be reserved for him on subsequent nights. Mr. Mackay plans to entertain at the opera all other employees of the postal system in Chicago, including the corps of messenger boys.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 3.
To inspect emigration Stations at Honolulu and points en route, Commissioner General Daniel J. Keefe will leave to-day on a tour that will require two months. Places that will be embraced in his itinerary include Sudbury, Winnipeg and Vancouver.

BISBEE, Ariz., Nov. 2.
Reports from Cananea, Sonora, Mexico, say that the body of former Governor Rafael Y. Sabele, of Sonora was stolen yesterday. Governor Y. Sabele died recently while returning from Europe, and the body was buried last week at Hermosillo.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 3.
Cablegrams were received last night from Honduras confirming the Associated Press despatches of the revolutionary outbreak at Amapala. That the U. S. will within the next few days take an active part in ousting General Jose Valladares, the leader of the rebellion, from his entrenched position on the little island of Amapala, is the belief of the business men of New Orleans, who are more or less interested in Central American trade. The Honduran Government has a very small army and as Valladares has several machine guns, it is thought that President Davila will ask the assistance of the United States Government in its efforts to get rid of the trouble maker in Amapala. The friends here of former President Manuel Ronilla assert that he has no connection with the revolt of Valladares. Noting his hatred of foreigners, Valladares recently publicly announced that he had his dog called "Taft," in order to show his contempt for the American Government.

SOUTH BRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 3.
The South Bridge Spectacle Company is soon to be moved to Montreal according to an announcement made by Joseph Outimet, Jr., President. An average of 300 hands are employed at the plant and in busy seasons 500.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 3.
The United States Gunboat Princeton is in the harbor of Amapala ready to take a hand in the Revolution at the first sign of hostilities toward foreigners or their interests. President Davila is preparing to send an armed force against Valladares and in event of the Government's failure to restore order on the island the United States probably will be asked to interfere. Commander Hix telegraphed the New York Department as follows: "The Commander of Amapala has informed the foreign consuls that he has no intention of interfering with foreign subjects or foreign property. There is no disorder at present. Little faith is put in his promises by officials of the United States Government, and the instruction to the Princeton are sufficiently liberal to permit her commander to meet any situation that arises."

During the early part of the week Health Inspector O'Brien had been visiting Bell Island in the interest of the Health Department. The inspection of milk farms occupied his best attention. There are now 107 farmers and others who keep milk cows. Most of the milk is produced for sale. Other farmers keep it for cream and butter. There are 125 milk cows on the island. The Department is desirous of impressing on milkers the necessity of keeping clean hands and also of keeping the cows udders, teats and quarters free from manure, otherwise clean milk cannot be expected.
