### SIR ORACLE SPEAKS.

The Hon. John Alexander Robinson represents the idea of the electorate turning out the Morris administration at the Fall election. He does not hesitate to declare the present state of conditions is highly satisfactory. We do not doubt his dislike of the anticipated change. He fears coming events and feels uncomfortable at the notion that he will shortly be in opposition. He appeals to the sweet reasonableness of the people and exhorts them to let Morris alone and not disturb him in the enjoyment of the sweets of office.

If the present condition of things is not so highly satisfactory to the Hon. John Crobie, who is disgruntled at the loss of some coal contracts by his firm, they are much

more satisfactory to him than the state of affairs which would ensue if Sir Edward Morris was turned down. The disturbance of the Morris Ministry would be far worse than its continuance. From that Ministry things have run much to his liking in the way of purchase of spars, coastal steam, and coal contracts. He, no doubt, joins John Alexander in exhorting electors to be reasonable and leave him to enjoy the good things that come his way.

Then there's the Hon. Donald Morrison who would not like a change. He can point to the complacent attitude of Sir Edward Morris and of Sir Ralph Williams in regard to the Morrison Memorials. Both of these doughty knights were sweetly reasonable and accepted his plea of forgetfulness of the provisions of the law to prevent Crown Land Licensees poaching timber in adjoining Crown Lands. They were also unimpressed with the impropriety of the other transactions revealed in the Memorials. Why should the electorate not be as complacent and not imperil the Morris administration, which, perish the thought, would disturb the honourable Minister of Justice himself? The present state of things is highly satisfactory to the Minister, why then should the electorate disturb him and others with the thoughts of an impending Royal Commission? The easy way out for the people is to uphold the Morris Government and then there will be no inquiry to disturb the equanimity of timber sharks.

The present state of affairs is highly satisfactory to the People's Party. Why should their picnics, fairs, patronage and grabs be imperilled? The electorate has only to be reasonable. The People's Party men do not want cold feet. The thought of a change gives them the shivers. Sir Edward will spend public money galore if only the electors will be reasonable and leave him in power. He is satisfied with the state of affairs. He does not bother himself about such trifles as a few millions more or less as the cost of railway building. Then why should the electors? Spend in the present and let the future take care of itself is his guiding principle. Why cannot the electors be satisfied? Sir Edward does not get excited about congestion of traffic and irregularity of trains. Why should the electors? He is sweetly reasonable with the operators of the railway. Why should

### From Liverpool.

The R.M.S. Sardinian, Capt. Henderson, reached port at 4 o'clock this morning from Liverpool. The run was made in nine days, during which adverse winds was experienced. She brought 950 tons of cargo, a large mail and these passengers in saloon: Sir Henry and Lady Lewis, Miss Lewis, Mrs. Oxley, Rev. W. E. Jenkins, J. J. Cowling, Miss A. Hewitt, C. Smith, T. H. Anderson, J. Miller, T. Urquhart, Hon. W. C. and Mrs. Job, Miss Job, Master Job, Miss Scott and 16 second class, besides a couple of hundred emigrants, mostly British people, who are bound to the Canadian Northwest.

### Pleasant Trip.

Mr. George Geary, the veteran sheriff and goal keeper at Ferryland, who is now bordering upon his 80th year, returned from a two months vacation in New York by the Stephano. He saw all the sights, visited Sing Sing, sat in the electric chair, went amongst the 1,600 prisoners confined there, and was shown about a Newfoundland. Mr. C. C. Pike, formerly at Pleasant Street, St. John's, but who had been in the New York Police Force for 30 years, who is a veteran of the Civil War and is now on light duty on a pension. Mr. Geary was in New York 62 years ago when he made his first visit there.

### From Labrador.

The s.s. Kyle, Capt. Parsons, arrived here at 7.30 a.m. yesterday from Labrador, completing her first trip to that coast in 14 days, going and returning. The ship went down as far as Smoky Tickle, which she reached on Monday last, the 9th inst., and met a good deal of ice, but the ship proved herself a fine ice-breaker and forced through it without difficulty, while she also proved to be an excellent sea boat. The ship could not proceed further north than Smoky, as a solid jam of ice confronted her, and having landed the crews and freight for that and other places, the ship started south. The Kyle made this run back, calling at all the ports of call, in 5 days, and but for heavy fog and the presence of innumerable icebergs, she would, on Saturday, have returned. The residents of the coast report they had a stormy and very cold winter, furs were comparatively scarce and trappers did not get much more in the shape of peltries than they did for the season of 1912. The food the ship carried in her cargo was a welcome item, and Saturday's heavy snowfall was reported on the coast the past winter. Her passengers here were W. G. Glesh, P. G. Smith, F. Lewis, Rev. G. Faddon and 4 steerage.

### Lost Foremast.

The schr. Nellie M. Capt. Keefer, left here yesterday for Cape Broyle deeply laden with supplies and carrying a deckload. Capt. Keefer was in company with the schr. J. J. Nolan and Mignonette, and it blew a stiff gale from N. W. by N. At 8.15 a.m., when trying to negotiate Cape Spear, a much heavier ordinary heavy squall struck her and carried the foremast out of her. It came to the deck with the men on board were near or they might have been killed. Skipper Keefer signalled for the tug and the Ingraham Mr. Foskitt came to the aid and put up at Goodridge's wharf at 11.15.

### A Splendid Yacht.

Messrs. Wm. Thos. and Isaac Bowring, of Bay Roberts, built a beautiful yacht the past winter at that place. The yacht is called the "Hudson" and is moored here in Job Bros. & Co's dock. On the run over she proved herself a splendid sailer and the sea has been very heavy. She has ten tons burden and her lines are extremely pretty and remind one of the handsome creations of famous expert builders. The yacht is decked, has a house forward for the accommodation of the crew and is a splendid model. She was built for the Hudson Bay Co. and will be sent along to the stations by the s.s. Nascopee. At Hudson Bay a powerful motor will be placed in the yacht. Yesterday hundreds visited Job Bros. premises to see her and all were delighted at this excellent display of marine architecture.

**AT CATALINA.**—The schooner "Drummers Tax" arrived at Catalina, from the Flemish Cap, with 400 qtls. fish to McCormack & Walsh, on Saturday.

**FOR HOSPITAL.**—Mrs. Wm. Webber, of Maine River, Bay St. George, died here by the express yesterday and was taken to hospital by Mr. E. H. Whiteway. She suffers from an internal malady and is very ill.

**EXCURSIONISTS LEAVE.**—The excursion train at 2.30 p.m. yesterday took over 300 passengers. Quite a number on the train and the express got off at Bowling Park and the bus and carriages also brought large numbers there after the train. The excursion train returned at 9.15 last night.

**BANKERS ARRIVE.**—The schr. Hazel B. Mosher and Robert reached St. Jacques on Saturday from the Gulf with 450 and 250 quintals of fish respectively. The schooner J. A. MacLean arrived from the Grand Banks with 350 quintals of fish. All three bankers report cod plentiful but weather conditions bad.

**FAREWELL SERMON.**—There was a large congregation at the Kirk last night, when Rev. Dr. McPhie preached an able and impressive sermon on "Abraham the Hebrew." Dr. McPhie who had been substituting for Rev. Mr. Sutherland, made numerous friends during his sojourn here. It is to be hoped that Dr. McPhie will visit our shores in the near future again.

**FISHERY NORTH.**—From Capt. Kean of the Prospero we learn that there is an improvement in the fishery north. Last week cod were abnormally plentiful at Twillingate and skipper T. White, got seventy quintals in his trap. Other fishermen secured good fares. There is a good sign of fish in White Bay and chances for "floaters" getting well fished are good.

**TOURISTS HERE.**—The Bruce express, Conductor Kelly, which arrived here at noon yesterday, dropped off a large number of American tourists at Stephenville, Doyle's, Ratling Brook and other places, where they will spend a fine salmon fishing. Mr. C. Crowe, an American lawyer, who comes along yearly with his wife, got off at Nardinis and will remain there fishing. Mr. Crowe also will come by the Lintrose express, due to-day.
