That Scandalous Mineral Prospectus.

What is Sir Edward Morris's attitude? Few people in this city valued the enormity of the scandal of the Bay-de-Verde Mineral Prospectus until it was detailed by the Telegram yesterday.

The promoters of that prospectus used the name of Sir Edward Morris, C.B., of his very Executive members, as a lever to exploit one of the most swindling schemes ever devised. Evidently Sir Edward Morris thinks it can be laughed off, that it is one of those things that is only a "red," that the workingman and the fisherman won't understand it. If he does not think that, do you think it is possible for a Premier to sleep without knowing that his principal Ministers, his Cabinet, are not involved?

Sir Edward Morris pharisaically assumes in his Manifesto that he is the only Premier having high "ideals of statesmanship."

He declares that M. P. Cuslin is fit to be Minister of Finance and a Trustee of the revenues of the country. He declares that C. H. Emerson, whose abilities must be of the elusive brand, is fit to be a Trustee of the country.

He probably has something good in view for brother Frank. He declares that all these men, his men, have high "ideals of statesmanship"—like himself.

We now put the matter plainly so that even all these "ideals" can read it, and we challenge them to read it without a blush.

That Mineral Prospectus was an intentionally deliberate, fraudulent attempt to swindle the people of Newfoundland.

It was an attempt to sell 50,000 shares in a company at \$7.50 each on the strength of intentionally wicked, fraudulent, deliberate lies.

It falsely and fraudulently represented that the Bay-de-Verde mineral property contained an estimated quantity of 40,000,000 tons of high grade Iron Ore, and a quantity of 200,000 tons available for shipment.

That fraudulent prospectus contained assurances that "several members of the present Cabinet of Newfoundland" would have active participation in the affairs of the company.

That fraudulent prospectus stated the names of Sir Edward Morris's Cabinet as follows:

COUNSEL
for the Company
"HON. DONALD MORISON, King's Counsel, Minister of Justice of the Colony of Newfoundland."

DIRECTORS
of the Company
"HON. MICHAEL P. CASHIN, M.E.C., Minister of Finance and Customs of the Colony of Newfoundland."
"HON. CHARLES H. EMERSON, King's Counsel, Member of the Executive Government of the Colony of Newfoundland."
"HON. FRANCIS J. MORRIS, K.C., Justice of the Circuit Court of the Colony of Newfoundland." Sir Edward Morris, the Premier with the high "ideals of statesmanship," has seen that fraudulent prospectus before.

We are informed that he has taken no step to inquire into that prospectus.

Can it be that the false and fraudulent statements in that prospectus do not conflict with his high "ideals of statesmanship?"

Can it be that he is ignorant of the proper course for a Premier with high "ideals" to pursue?

If he is deficient in ideas we take the liberty of informing him that the proper course for a Premier with high "ideals of statesmanship" to pursue is as plain as the nose on his face.

The publication of that prospectus in England has brought the name of Newfoundland, and its people, into disrepute; the publication has involved the name of some of the highest Government officials in the Colony.

When Donald Morison wrote to Sir Edward Morris, Minister of Justice, that a purchaser of Morison's Orange Bay Timber could steal loss from the adjoining Crown land.

What Sir Edward Morris, the Premier, with such high "ideals of statesmanship," told Governor Williams that it was "perfectly ridiculous" to think that Morison, his Minister of Justice, remembered the timber law when he wrote that letter to Sir Edward.

Surely these things made the people feel ridiculous enough. Surely these things do conflict with high "ideals of statesmanship." Surely a Premier with "high ideals" should have acted differently—unless, of course, Morison is the paragon of honesty, the "ideal" of statesmanship.

So long as Morison, Cuslin, Emerson and F. J. Morris keep silent, and so long as Premier Morris remains in his cabinet or in his party, keeping silent, so long does Premier Morris—whether he has high ideals or no ideals, whether he has honesty of purpose or no purpose—so long does he ignore the demands of a people whose patience is not unlimited, so long will he, the Premier with "ideals" be considered as conniving at their silence, and so long will he be despised from existing in any, but pharisaical pretensions.

The appearance of Sir Robert Bond in the arena of active politics to the people of Newfoundland, as an oasis in a traveller in a desert of —

Let Premier Morris take his own ideal course, and the people will take theirs, and vote accordingly.

If Morris and his Cabinet are full of ideas they will end on October 30th they will be deficient in votes.
