A STORY TIME EXPERIENCED BY PEOPLE'S PARTY IN BAY ROBERTS.

BAY ROBERTS, Today. The Grabbals attempted to hold a meeting here last night and had a very stormy time. When Piccott, Parsons and Young reached the hall they found it in possession of Liberal Union men. For a while they could not get on the platform and had to listen to prolonged cheers for the Liberal Union Candidates. The Grabbals found it almost impossible to appoint a chairman and when he was appointed he could exercise no control at all of the meeting. Parsons was continually checked and interrupted, finally having to give up his attempts to make a speech. The Tories present made an attack on the Liberals and Union men and a free fight developed. The meeting was absolutely broken up. Liberal Union party left the hall in a body, shouting as they went, "now go on with your committee meeting." Body of hall was left absolutely empty, every seat being vacant showing that the majority of these present were opponents of Piccott and his colleagues. The Liberal Union Candidates had an excellent meeting at Hr. Grace last night, over six hundred voters were present and applauded enthusiastically for Bond, Coaker and the Liberal Union Candidates. The Grabbals will get a very small percentage of votes there and of these a good proportion will split for Gordon who is immensely popular at Bay Roberts. Last night ringing cheers were given for Bond and Coaker every time the Grabbals candidates mentioned their names. The Liberal Union men would not permit Piccott and his colleagues to indulge in personalities regarding the Liberal Union Candidates. A big victory today for Bond, Coaker and the Union in Hr. Grace district.

Old Messina, once the richest and most beautiful city of Southern Italy, still lies in the ruins to which it was flung by the great earthquake of December, 1903.

A special correspondent of the Daily Chronicle, who was early on the scene of the disaster over four years ago, has just revisited the city, and gives a vivid picture of the wreckage and desolation that still remain.

The earthquake served to reveal the fact that, with the exception of Rome, Old Messina was the richest city in Italy. Already over £2,000,000 in treasure has been recovered from the ruins.
