## Side Talks by Ruth Cameron

### A WRONG WAY TO EXPRESS ONESELF.

A friend of mine hates to go on a train journey with her husband because he is always so irritable if any connection goes wrong. His justification is "I hate to wait."

Suppose he does hate to wait. Is that any reason he should express his mood of impatience by ir-

ritability? Why indeed should we express by irritability any mood except annoyance with the person attacked. (I do not mean that even that is a justification for irritability, but there is some shadow of reason for it.)

And yet how many moods do take irritability as their form of expression!

He Was Cross to Her Because He Loved her So Much!

I know a woman who had to give up riding, an art in which she was very proficient, because her husband was always so irritable while she was gone and on her return. Sometimes he would fairly take her head off. And his justification was "I was so anxious about you. I was afraid something had happened. It's only because I love you so much."

It is wonderful to be greatly loved but I cannot think that is a truly great love that expresses itself in irritability.

I once went on a motor ride with some friends, and during the last part of the ride the husband was a terrible grouch, answering his guests in monosyllables and snapping his wife's head off (presumably he made this reference because he loved her best.)

He Was Irritable Because He Was Hurried.

Afterwards his wife explained "You know Henry was trying to get the S's back in time to catch that train and he was afraid we were going to be late and that made him so cross. He was always irritable when he is in a hurry."

Again, I knew a woman who devoted rainy weather and who was always irritable after a day or two of bad weather.

Of course there is no doubt that the desire to lash out at people is often a sign of ill health. The colon is not acting rightly or the kidneys or the liver or some part of this mechanism of ours that is so much more wonderful than any machine and gets so much less attention when it shows

signs of derangement. Anyone who feels cross most of the time, probably needs a doctor.

But Don't Forget to be Your Own Doctor, Too.

"But even when ill health does enter into our irritability it can still be controlled to a large degree. In a recent magazine a doctor writing on a kindred subject says, "Though the mind is never wholly free it can still to a certain extent dominate the effects of toxins. When I have caught cold or have been up late at night and my nervous system is in need of rest and replenishment, I am cross to those whom I love and irritating to people in my employ. I manage to cheer up wonderfully, however, if it becomes necessary to make a pleasant impression on someone. I can do this because my will is dominating temporarily."

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## Lindsay Crawford's Ravings.

(From the Toronto Telegram.)

Out-Hearsting Hearst in the bitterness of his anti-British ravings, Mr. Lindsay Crawford is flitting about the United States and addressing meetings in a frenzied attempt to stir up hatred against the Motherland. He stigmatizes the "ruling classes" of Britain as "oppressors" of Egypt, India, and Ireland, declares Britain should have gone down to perdition along with Germany, and loudly calls upon the people of the United States to protest against the occupation of Ireland by British forces.

Until twelve years ago Mr. Crawford lived in Ireland, never having even seen Canada. Nevertheless he presumes to mount public platforms in the United States, pose as a representative Canadian whose opinion is widely shared in Canada, and to incite the people of the great republic against Britain.

Mr. Crawford's opinions no more represent thought in Canada than do the wild speeches of certain long-haired Russians who, lately admitted to citizenship in the United States, have been telling Washington how the U.S.A. must be run. Loyal Americans bitterly resent the impudence of these newly-naturalized foreigners from Eastern Europe, as do loyal Canadians the even more flagrant action of Lindsay Crawford. The Bolshevik Russians don't know any better, whereas Lindsay Crawford, not a foreigner at all, but a native Irishman, knows well the conditions of Ireland—knows that it is a quarrel between Ireland of north and south, and that Britain has acted all through with justice and forbearance in the

Irish question, for the happy solution of which the Motherland devoutly prays.

Let Americans rest assured that Lindsay Crawford is of no more account in Canada than the puniest soap-box orator who ever in the U.S.A. urged a crowd of malcontents to overthrow the United States Government.

Mr. Crawford's authority to speak for Canada is based on the fact that for a short time he adorned the staff of a publication that advertised itself as "Canada's National Newspaper." He has succeeded in projecting himself into the limelight occasionally by making speeches which are remarkable only for their disregard of truth, lack of information, and their studied animosity towards everything British.

Were it not that other people equally ignorant might be deceived by his distillations, it would be of no importance what Lindsay Crawford said about Canadian sentiment on the Irish question or anything else.
