Kemal's Army Gives Greeks Much Worry.

With the Greek Army in the field, Sept. 30. (The Associated Press)—Mustapha Kemal's daring cavalrymen and irregulars who are scattered about Anatolia have given the Greek Army a great deal of anxiety by their attacks upon Greek columns and their bold attempts to capture the Greek General Staff. Crown Prince George of Greece had a narrow escape from injury in one of these Turkish surprise attacks and was hurriedly taken to a place of safety. It was the first real danger he had experienced since he came to the front. While the Greek army was advancing toward Angora, thousands of these Turks in the rear of the Greek line, were a constant menace to the Greek communications. They turned up when least expected. They advanced quietly to their positions at night and began their attacks at daybreak.

When The Associated Press correspondents at Dumbek, south of the Sakaria River, several hundreds of these Turkish horsemen descended upon the village and attempted to carry off the General Staff, including General Papoulas, Commander-in-Chief, and Prince George. They shelled the barracks and tents of the Greeks and kept up a steady rifle and machine-gun fire. One of their shells fell within 40 yards of Crown Prince George, but fortunately it did not explode. The Greek General Staff was preparing to move 25 miles nearer the front, and the Turkish assault from the rear took them completely by surprise. Only the fact that headquarters had 300 infantrymen available saved the whole Greek executive organization from capture. Had the Turks come the day before they would have found only a handful of men to oppose them, and it is probable at least a part of the Greek staff would have fallen into their hands. The Turkish cavalrymen galloped across the low-lying hills at daybreak and took up positions about a mile from the village in which Greek G.H.Q. were located. At the sound of the alarm from Greek sentries on the crests, General Papoulas ordered every available man, even clerks, typists and orderlies, to take up rifles. The Turkish shells and bullets were humming overhead. Within a few minutes the Greeks had several hundred men ready to answer the Turkish attack. The enemy's fire was so hot and close that the Greeks were able to advance only slowly. They were soon joined by other forces, however, and after two hours of sustained rifle and machine-gun fire the Kemalists were obliged to fall back. They then took refuge in the distant ravines and valleys, and the Greeks returned to their work of transferring G.H.Q. to another spot.

Dr. Downes, a prominent Wesleyan minister, to be the "fastest town in the world." By that he means the wickedest. "Brighton," he says, "is full of slaves of sensualism. Babes are being nursed in the cradle of immorality and vice. Conscience is here waiting in darkness for earnest Christian work."

The Rev. J. Dixon, another Wesleyan minister, backed him up in his denunciation of the immorality of Brighton. "There's not a town in England in greater need of Methodism," he said. "Nowhere else can you see such a display of the vagaries and follies of fashion."



Where Musk Comes From.

Musk in the raw looks a good deal like stale grease, and smells worse. The popular notion that the musk of commerce is obtained from the muskrat is a mistake. A somewhat similar perfume may be obtained from the muskrat, but most of the supply comes from the muskdeer, a creature that is carefully reared in India for the sake of the secretion. The secretion is shipped in the crude shape, and is used not only in the manufacture of the liquid perfumes sold as musk, but also in very small quantities to give strength and staying power to many perfumes made from the essential oils of flowers.

Curiously enough, the blossoms of two native plants have a noticeably musky odour. One is the well-known small yellow blossom. Its odour is marked, and is counteracted in the commercial perfume called musk. The other is the blood-root.

The pure white blossom of that early spring plant has a distinct though delicate musky odour. A bean known as the musk-bean is a cheap substitute for animal musk.

Beneath the Waves.

Lying along the beds of oceans are about two hundred and twenty-five thousand miles of submarine telegraph cables. More than half of this immense mileage is British, and every year British messages number all told 100,000,000 words. In forty years we have virtually forgotten that the seas were once barriers to international communication. Now they have been narrowed by speedy ships and the deep-laying cables until, as far as communication is concerned, they are little wider than streams across which men can shout to one another. The greatest known depth of the sea is in the mid-Pacific Ocean, and is recorded as five thousand two hundred and sixty-nine fathoms—thirty-one thousand six hundred and fourteen feet—or sixty-six feet short of six statute miles. This sounding was obtained on the United States steamship "Nero," and it is greater than any elevation on that continent, or as far as known, in the world.
