The Great Western Directors' Report.

The first report of the new Board of Directors of the Great Western Railway has been published. The Board are of opinion that the financial position of the Company should be at once strengthened, in order to enable those who are responsible for its administration to hold their emergencies, and with this view they propose to issue to existing share-holders the balance of the unissued share capital, viz:-49,918 shares at £20. 10s. each. Owing to the difficulties in which they found the affairs of the Detroit and Milwaukee Railway placed, they propose to ask, at a special meeting, the necessary power and authority to afford such financial aid to the Detroit and Milwaukee Railroad Company, and to concur in such re-arrangement of its securities, as they may deem expe-

The Board have entered into a provisional agreement with the Canada South arn Railway Company with reference to access by that Company to the Nivgara Suspension Bridge. Several clauses following refer to the state of the Company's accounts, and the receipts and expenditure.
