LATEST FROM IRELAND.
Alderman Higgins became mayor of Sligo this month.
Trinity College, Dublin, will celebrate its tercentenary this year.
Mr. T. D. Reardon, Dublin, a well-known member of the Irish bar, died recently.

W. E. Murphy, long manager of the Limerick branch of the Bank of Ireland, is dead.
On New Year's day Aid. Meade was inaugurated as Lord Mayor of Dublin for 1892.

Capt. Andrews, Governor of the Clonmel jail, has been appointed Governor of Kilmalham Prison.

Mr. Wm. O'Brien says that at the general election his friends will win 82 out of the 85 Irish constituencies.

Patrick Forde has died at his residence near Mill street, county Cork, at the age of 105 years. He was a gamekeeper.

In Dublin, on the 5th inst., Nursing Sister M. A. Gardiner, of the Royal Infirmary Hospital, who died in that institution, was accorded a military funeral, the remains being carried on a gun carriage covered with the British ensign, and an escort being furnished by the Tenth Hussars.

LATEST SCOTTISH GOSSIP.
The Earl of Aberdeen is to lay the foundation stone of the new Salvation Army barracks in Aberdeen.

Lord Lothian is seriously indisposed, and it is said his resignation of the office of Secretary of State for Scotland is contemplated.

By the will of the late Mrs. Jane Lang, Magdala Crescent, Edinburgh, the Church of Scotland receives legacies amounting to over £5,000.

The entire Roman Catholic population of Scotland is estimated at 352,749, and the Archdiocese of Glasgow claims 230,000 of that total, or nearly two-thirds.

The committee in charge of the subscription for a statue in Aberdeen to the poet Burns have suggested to the Town Council that they should provide a site and a pedestal for the monument.

Mr. Sinclair, ex-M.P. for Ayr Burghs, died at his residence in Grangemouth on Jan. 7 from influenza. He had been in indifferent health for some time. Mr. Sinclair was at one time a Free Church minister.

The plague of mice in Borthwick and Ettrick Vales, as well as in the surrounding district above Hawick, continues almost unabated. The mice swarm in millions, devastating thousands of acres of good pasture land.

Rev. Dr. McKee, parish minister of Hawick, died on the 8th inst., aged 70 years. He was born in Glasgow. In the year of the disruption, 1843, Dr. McKee was presented to the parish of Hawick, and had been its minister ever since.

The will of the late Mr. Thomas Cox, of Dundas, provides for the payment of £10,000 for the furtherance of public, social or other purposes in Lochee, and for the payment of £3,000 to charitable or benevolent institutions. The remainder of the property, which it is rumored amounts to about £1,500,000, is bequeathed to relatives.

Rev. John Davidson, D.D., Inverurie, Aberdeenshire, died on Jan. 8, in his 75th year. Dr. Davidson had been minister of Inverurie for 46 years, and was best known as the author of "Inverurie and the Earl of the Garioch." For his scholarship and literary attainments he received the degree of D.D. from Aberdeen University, of which he was a graduate.

It is stated that Sir William Thomson will take his seat in the House of Lords as Lord Kelvin. In thus taking his title from a Scottish river he follows the example of Sir Colin Campbell, who on being raised to the peerage chose the title of Lord Clyde. The Kelvin flows past the Glasgow University, an institution with which Sir William has been identified the greater part of his life.
