—Mr. Thomas Dickson, of Dickson &

Assembly meeting in St. John, N. B.—Mr. H. S. Dickson, late with T. B.  
Escott & Co., wholesale grocers, has ac-  
cepted a position with H. T. Johnson,  
grocer, Ridgeway.—Mr. O. J. Stevenson, of the London Col-  
legiate Institute, obtained the degree of  
M. A. at the recent Toronto University  
examinations. The institute made a  
splendid showing.—J. D. McIlwain and family, of Harvey,  
Ill., formerly of London, were in town to-  
day on their way to Buffalo to live, where  
Mr. McIlwain has secured a more respon-  
sible position at Depeu, managing the car  
department of the N. Y. C. It is three  
years nearly since he left this city.—The Pastime Pleasure Club provided a  
very enjoyable concert for a large crowd in  
the East End Hall last night. The pro-  
gramme opened with an instrumental by  
Messrs. Watt and Burness, the other par-  
ticipants being Miss McLean, Messrs. N.

the whole concluding with "The Doctor's

McLaughlin presided. The receipts go to  
the Pastime Baseball Club.—No. 1 committee of the Board of Edu-  
cation yesterday afternoon considered a  
request from Treasurer Pope, who wanted  
a change in the method of paying the  
teachers. A change will be recommended  
to the board. Applicants for positions on  
the staff of kindergarten directors and  
assistants from Misses Tyrrell, A. M.  
Matthews and Edith Wilcox were laid over  
for future reference. The principal of  
Park street school asked the privilege of  
teaching senior third in his school and it was  
granted. Mrs. Booth was added to the list of  
substitute teachers. The application of  
Miss M. Gray to be brought under the rule  
of the board, which grants an additional  
\$12.50 to each teacher who has served the  
board two years prior to going to the  
Normal School, was referred to the in-  
spector for full particulars. Tenders for  
printing the examination papers for the  
public schools will be asked for, and the  
awarding of the contract was left  
with Messrs. Alexander and Jeffery.  
It was decided to ask for tenders for paper,  
etc., for use at the examinations. Present:

The monthly meeting of the London  
branch of the Mission to Lepers was held  
in Somerset Hall yesterday (June 11) after-  
noon, the president, Mrs. Robertson, in  
the chair. The meeting was opened with  
Scripture reading and prayer by Miss  
Gourley. An instructive address was  
given by Miss Yeates, showing how the  
Mission to Lepers has carried on its work  
in the East since its foundation in 1874.  
Miss Much rendered the solo "The Chil-  
dren's Home," with deep feeling. Letters  
from the mission stations were read by  
Miss Nellie Morris, and a magazine article,  
giving a short account of the work done at  
the leper asylums during 1893, was read by  
Mrs. Ryart.

next will come the Park street school,  
Rectory street, Lorne avenue, Princess

street, thence to Dundas and east to the
