Peculiar Incident at the Indian Relief Works.

We ran out by train to a small ralliway station in the Allahabad district, where relief workers were coming on to the works in startlingly large numbers. The first whing we saw after leaving the railway station was a crowd of about 1,000 country folk sitting down in the dry bed of a mank. The local authorities ex plained what the people had come there

We then drove on to see the relief the best work to which they had been refused admission. It consisted of remarking an old road and deepening an old tank. On the road work was in full swing The Lieutenant-Governor asked the Public Works officials what was going n in the tanks, as owing to the high bank we could not see the worker "Ch!" said the ready local official,

My curiosity led me to walk across the fields Whalt I saw was about 2,000 p ple, comfortafoly grouped into "gangs' in the dry bed of the tank, without a single tool, and, needless to say, doing no work.
