A Conservative President Resolves to Support Hon. Wilfrid Laurier.

Good Reasons for a Change of Government at Ottawa.

Cornwall, May 9.—There is quite a commotion in the Conservative ranks owing to the withdrawal of ex-Mayor A. F. Mulhern, president of the Conservative Association of Cornwall and Stormont. Mr. Mulhern was the organizer of the Conservative Association here, and his loss to the Tory party will be keenly felt. He addresses the following letter to the local press of today's issue:

"To the Executive of the Conservative Association of Cornwall and

Stormont: "Gentlemen,-I hereby tender my resignation as president of the Con-servative Association of Cornwall and Stormont, and also desire to state that I have decided to withdraw from the Conservative party. I feel that I should express to my many warm friends in the Conservative ranks in Cornwall and Stormont my appreciation and gratitude to them for their many kindnesses and loyalty to me president of the association. Before deciding to retire from the party I have given the matter full and deliberate consideration, and I have come to the conclusion that consistently with the views I now hold, indorse the policy of the Conservative party as developed during the last session of Parliament. Sir Mackenzie Bowell having been treated most unfairly by the men who are now accepted as the leaders to fill the positions of the great statesmen, the late Sir John Macdonald and the late Sir John Thompson. I feel it would be subordinating my common sense and intelligence if I supported them in the coming campaign. For years I have stood by but rather than accept the plank in the Liberal platform of unrestricted reciprocity or commercial union with United States, I assisted in my humble way in opposing that plank in burn. their platform, and which platform, Re and which question were unequivocally repudiated by the people of Canada at the polls, they being uncompromisingly hostile to any policy that savors of unpatriotic influence in the relationship which unites us to the motherland. The Liberals have, as I understand, wisely accepted the verdict, and the question of unrereciprocity or commercial union has disappeared from the arena of practical politics. Now that the Hon. Wilfrid Laurier has declared openly for the readjustment of the tariff upon wise and conservative lines, and not with the view of destroying the industries of the country, and believing that the commonsense of the people is strongly in favor of a purer and more econo mical administration in the expend ture of the people's money, and that will not support any further additions to the national debt of Canada (which is now at the limit line) by such financing as the Curran bridge. 
