**MR. TARTE'S VIEWS.**

**The Liberal Triumph Will Have a Beneficent Influence on the Dominion.**

Mr. Tarte puts the same construction on the Quebec victory as has been placed on it by the "Advertiser." He says: "The Province of Quebec has spoken nobly. They have stood up like men, with a result that should be satisfactory to every free man. We have been unjustly and unfairly treated by a number of the Roman Catholic clergy. I had it myself, not from Bishop Emard, but from three or four of the priests."  
"How do you account for the failure of the mandement to affect the vote?" was asked.  
"From the feeling amongst my countrymen that they are free," was Mr. Tarte's answer. "They knew that right was with them, that they are British citizens, and that in politics they are perfectly free to do as they please. I claim that the dangerous doctrine that has been promulgated during this campaign is not the doctrine of the Roman Catholic Church."  
"This battle," concluded Mr. Tarte, "is going to have an immense effect on the future of Canada. It will cement the two races together. All true Canadians will feel the benefit of being free, and that we must dwell together in peace and harmony in order to protect our interests."

**STRENGTH OF MAN.**

**It Declines Slowly After the Thirty-First Year.**

The muscles, in common with all the organs of the body, have their stages of development and decline; our physical strength increases up to a certain point and then decreases. Tests of the strength of several thousands of people have been made by means of a dynamometer (strength measure), and the following are given as the average figures for the white race:  
The "lifting power" of a youth of 17 years is 280 pounds; in his 20th year this increases to 320 pounds; and in the 30th and 31st years it reaches its height—350 pounds. At the end of the 31st year the strength begins to decline, very slowly at first.  
By the 40th year it has decreased eight pounds; and this diminution continues at a slightly increasing rate until the 50th year is reached, when the figure is 330 pounds.  
After this period the strength falls more and more rapidly until the weakness of old age is reached. It is not possible to give statistics of the decline of strength after the 50th year, as it varies to a large extent in different individuals.

ONE OF THE POLL BOOKS ACCOUNTED FOR.

To the Editor of the "Advertiser":

In your issue of today, under the head of "Astounding condition of affairs" at the summing up of the returning officer, re London election, you state that the poll book in No. 23 subdivision was missing. Now, as I was deputy returning officer there, such a report, if true, is a reflection on myself. Therefore, I wish to state the facts in connection with the case, in so far as I am concerned.

At the close of the poll, after having counted the ballots and placed them in their respective envelopes and properly sealed them, I then enclosed the poll book, list of voters, containing statement, etc., in a large envelope, provided for the purpose, which was properly sealed and signed by myself, the poll clerk, Mr. T. H. Luscombe, agent for Mr. Hyman, and W. O. Carson, agent for Mr. Beattie.

The several envelopes were then put in the ballot box in the presence of the poll clerk and the agents of the two candidates, the ballot box securely locked and properly sealed.

I may, however, state that there is a difference of opinion as to whether the poll book should be put in the ballot box separately or enclosed in the large envelope provided, as I understand, for the purpose. However, after consulting with the agents of the candidates, Messrs. Luscombe and Carson, we decided to place the poll book, list of voters, etc., in the envelope, and which was accordingly done, and which I hold was the proper place for it.
