A comparison of distances from Chicago to Liverpool shows the advant-From here to Montreal via Midland, in Georgian Bay, where most of the wheat is being consigned, the charts indicate 1,083 nautical miles, and from Montreal to Liverpool 2,773 miles—a total of 3,856 miles. This compares with a distance of 773 miles from Chicago to Buffalo, 430 miles from the latter port to New York, and 8,105 miles from New York to Liverpool-a total of 4,308 miles, the gain being 452 miles in Montreal's favor. Quebec affords even a shorter route to Europe, and considerable grain is

going that way via the St. Lawrence River. Vesselmen believe that, in addition to the grain shipped from Chicago, lake and rail to Canada, there will also be enormous quantities shipped from Manitoba and the North west by way of the St. Lawrence dure ing the season of navigation.
