

## Hotel Too Close to Massey's Men

Toronto, June 9.—Stating that the Massey estate purposed spending \$100,000 or more in the establishment of a clubhouse and athletic grounds for their employees and wished to remove temptation of indulgence in intoxicating liquor, Thomas Findlay, assistant general-manager of the Massey-Harris Company, appeared before the board of license commissioners today with a proposition for the removal of the Palace Hotel from King and Strachan streets, immediately in front of the Massey-Harris plant, to some other locality.

## Mexican Revolt Starts a Massacre

Merida, Mex., June 10.—The first consignment of troops to arrive here from Vera Cruz are being rushed to the vicinity of Valladolid, where the Maya Indians are said to be well entrenched and ready for battle. Communication with the turbulent district is very difficult on account of destruction of many miles of railway, and the cutting of the telegraph wires by the rebels. The railroad is in operation to Izamal, some distance this side of Valladolid. It is reported that the town of Citar has been captured by the Indians, and that there was a heavy loss of life and much property destroyed. A number of

## AMERICAN WOMAN MURDERED IN ITALY

### Fishermen at Como Find Body in a Submerged Trunk.

Como, Italy, June 10.—Fishermen today discovered, submerged in a lake near the village of Moltras, a trunk, which, when towed ashore, was found to contain the body of a woman believed by the police to have been an American. Wounds on the head, plainly made by blows, indicated that the woman had been murdered. The body was wrapped in a piece of cloth which bore the initials "G. L." The trunk also contained letters written in English and the photograph of a young woman, evidently that of the victim. It is recalled that a young couple recently occupied a villa on the shore of the lake. Three days ago the two disappeared and were not again seen by people of the vicinity. The woman spoke English. Her companion attempted French but obviously it was not his native tongue.

### LINE TO PAIN COURT

The C. W. and L. E. Have Berchard Held-up Moved. [Special to The Advertiser.] Chatham, June 9.—The Chatham, Wallaceburg and Lake Erie Railway Company are now in a position to extend their lines to Pain Court, and the work will be pushed through at once. The decision of the railway commission at Ottawa, setting aside an objection of Mr. Berchard, of Dover, to the road going through his property, enables the company to go ahead with the work of construction. The company began the extension to Pain Court about a year ago, but was held up by Mr. Berchard, who would not allow the line to cross his property. J. G. Kerr, solicitor for the road, has been in Ottawa this week on the case, and has just wired President Kipp that he was successful in having Berchard's objection overcome.

## LONE HIGHWAYMAN LOOTS PASSENGERS

### Goos Through Pockets of Pullman Car Inmates and Takes to the Mountains.

El Paso, Texas, June 10.—A lone highwayman held up an El Paso and Southwestern train eastbound, last night. The train was stopped one mile east of Robarts, near Carrizozo, and one Pullman car was gone through and every passenger robbed. The bandit then left the train and headed for the mountains.

The Pullman passengers are without money and the conductor has wired to the superintendent in Kansas City for instructions to be sent him at Dalhart. The highwayman forced the passengers into Superintendent G. F. Hawks' private car, which was attached to the train, where he made them all, including the superintendent, deliver their valuables and money. Rough estimates place the value of the train robber's haul at several thousand dollars. One mile east of Robarts, New Mexico, near Carrizozo, the robber, who had boarded the train at Carrizozo, covered the Pullman conductor and brakeman with his gun and compelled them to stop the train. Driving the men before him he entered the sleeping car, awakening the occupants with a gruff command to gather their valuables together and proceed to the private car of Superintendent G. F. Hawks, in the rear. One by one the half-dressed passengers were covered by the robber's gun as they clamored from their berths. Taking his time and exhibiting remarkable coolness the bandit carefully took an inventory of what each bore in his uplifted hands. The job was thorough, not a passenger escaping and not one being able to keep anything of value.

When all the berths were emptied, the bandit drove his victims into the private car where all, including Superintendent Hawks, were told to place their property in a pile on the floor. Still covering the crowd with his gun the bandit swept the plunder into a sack and backed out of the car. As he departed he shot out the rear lights on the train, firing four times.

Hastily organized posses are in pursuit of the robber in the hope of intercepting him before he can cross the desert to the mountains toward which he is headed.

## THE DATES ARRANGED FOR WESTERN TOUR

### Premier to Leave Toronto July 7th and Be Away Two Months.

Ottawa, June 10.—The itinerary of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's political tour of Western Canada during the next two months was announced today. Leaving Toronto on the night of Thursday, July 7, for Port Arthur, a full sixty days will be spent between that point and the west, the return to the capital being fixed for Sept. 8. Sir Wilfrid, who will be accompanied by Hon. George F. Graham, Mr. E. P. Pardee, M. P., Mr. E. M. Macdonald, M. P., and Senator Wm. Gibson, will travel by special train from Port Arthur, where he will address four meetings in Manitoba, eight in Saskatchewan, five in Alberta, and four in British Columbia, making, with the Port Arthur meeting, 22 in all, and covering all the larger centres in the west. In addition short stops will be made at about a dozen other places where, although no public meetings have been arranged, the Prime Minister will have an opportunity of meeting the citizens and getting acquainted with the localities.

Port Arthur will be reached on Friday night, July 8, and a public meeting will be held there the following night. Winnipeg will be reached on Monday morning, July 11, and a public meeting will be held there that night. On Wednesday, the 13th, the Premier will leave for St. Anne, where a public meeting will be held in the afternoon. Returning to Winnipeg for Thursday, the party will leave for Morden on Friday, the 15th, where a public meeting will be held in the evening. On Saturday a few hours will be spent in Somerset, and Sunday, the 17th, will be spent in Winnipeg.

Other points in the itinerary are as follows: Brandon, July 18; Yorkton, July 20; Melville, July 22; Saskatoon, July 23 and 24, with a public meeting on the latter date; Humboldt, July 25; Prince Albert, July 27; Melfort, July 28; Regina, Aug. 1; Weyburn, Aug. 3; Moosejaw, Aug. 5; Battleford, Aug. 7; Lloydminster and Vermilion, Aug. 8; Edmonton, Aug. 9; Red Deer, Aug. 10; Calgary, Aug. 13; Banff, Aug. 14; Vancouver, Aug. 16 and 17; Victoria, Aug. 18.

From Victoria Sir Wilfrid and party will go by steamer to Prince Rupert, where Saturday and Sunday, the 20th and 21st, will be spent. Vancouver will be reached on the return journey on Wednesday, Aug. 24. Kamloops on Aug. 25; Nelson, Aug. 28; Lethbridge, Sept. 1; Medicine Hat, Sept. 2; Edmonton, Sept. 3; Winnipeg, Sept. 5 or 6.

## A CANADIAN TO ACT

### Will Be Arbitrator in U. S.-Mexico Border Dispute.

Washington, June 10.—Mexico has agreed to the terms of arbitration proposed by the United States for the settlement of the Chamizal controversy which arose over the question of a portion of boundary between the United States and Mexico in the vicinity of El Paso, Texas.

The terms of the proposition have been defined only in a general tentative form at the present time, and the details of the agreement will be formulated in the near future. A Canadian jurist, whose name has not yet been announced, it is said, will be the arbitrator.

## TAFT CLOSES DOOR ON REPRESENTATIVE

### Refuses to See a Congressman Who Accused Him of Deception.

Washington, June 9.—President Taft today declined to receive Representative Francis Burton Harrison, Democrat, of New York, who called at the White House in company with two other representatives, to introduce a number of Jewish rabbis, who took up with the president the question of the expulsion of Jews from Russia.

The President received the delegation and chatted with the members for fifteen minutes or more. Representative Goldfogel, of New York, acted as the spokesman for the party, and so adroitly had the situation been handled by Secretary Norton that no one of the callers knew anything of the incident until Mr. Harrison returned to the capitol, and there made a statement to the effect that he had been rebuffed by the President.

Mr. Taft based his refusal to see Mr. Harrison on statements attributed by newspapers to the representative in connection with his resolution in the House calling on Attorney-General Wickersham for full information as to the connection of his office with the Ballinger-Pinchot episode.

Mr. Harrison, according to the White House version of the matter, charged the president said the attorney-general with having willfully attempted to mislead Congress in the backdating of the attorney-general's summary of the Glick charges against Mr. Ballinger. Mr. Harrison was first quoted as having declared that he could assign no reason for the President's action. He said he had made the engagement with the President some ten days ago and had received no intimation that his presence at the White House was undesirable.

## PICKLES EMPTIED ALL OVER DETTER

### Tried to Charge Mrs. Zulloff Two Cents for a One-Cent Pickle.

New York, June 10.—As brought out today in Essex market court, the facts in their chronological order appear to be as follows:

Mrs. Anna Zulloff, natron, craved a pickle. Joseph Detter, a push cart merchant had pickles in a tub. Mrs. Zulloff left her apartment in Suffolk street, and went forth to traffic with Joseph Detter.

In the course of the necessary negotiations Mrs. Zulloff told Detter like a lady that he was a robber and loafer and a low-life for wanting two cents for a regular size one-cent pickle.

Detter reproached Mrs. Zulloff for squeezing the pickle in question with such emphasis as to affect its symmetry.

Mrs. Zulloff smote Detter in the eye with his own pickle, producing temporary blindness on his part. Mrs. Detter, growing wildly, seized Mrs. Zulloff by her back hair.

Mrs. Zulloff's gold locket, value \$50, was loosened from its clasp and fell into the pickle conservatory.

Mrs. Zulloff screamed for help. Nine thousand east side ladies (estimated number), arrived practically simultaneously.

Two stout ladies held the struggling Detter, while two others upended the conservatory with its contents upon his head, badly disarranging his toilet and filling his whiskers full of green pickles.

Mrs. Zulloff lost her locket.

Mrs. Detter lost his pickles and his disposition.

## MUNYON AND WIFE FIGHT IN PUBLIC

Philadelphia, June 10.—Prof. James M. Munyon and his young wife, whose sensational marriage to the home remedy practitioner and subsequent filing and withdrawal of a divorce suit aroused general interest last year, had a family tilt in a large touring car in front of the city hall today on their way to Washington.

The marital troubles were viewed by several hundred people who happened to be passing the city hall at the time, but so rapidly did the scenes shift and so quickly was the entire incident over that spectators rubbed their eyes to make sure that what they had seen had not been a rapid-fire moving picture from a five-cent theatre. Observers saw Mrs. Munyon deliberately reach over and strike her spouse a hard blow on the side of the head and then take turns about in throwing his necktie, hat, coat and suitcase from the car. No words were spoken and the doctor sat immovable through it all, not deigning to notice the woman by his side. Mrs. Munyon was dressed in a lavender suit, a large automobile hat and veil and spring clothes in general. Dr. Munyon is about 60 and his wife past 30.
