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BANK ROBBERS MURDER OFFICIALS

Gang at McKee's Rocks Deliberately Shot Down Manager and Cashier and Fire at Citizens.

Pittsburg, April 5.—At 8:20 this evening the most sensational bank robbery in the history of Pennsylvania, if not the entire country, occurred at McKee's Rocks, a suburb six miles below Pittsburg.

Robert King, a citizen, shot down the street in the direction of the bank with the plunder; at McKee's Rocks hospital, will live.

McKee's Rocks and Schoenville adjoining were each terrorized for about 30 minutes during and after the bank robbery.

From what can be gathered by deduction, the two who entered the bank appeared to have walked right up to the cashier's desk.

Three of the attacking party appear to have shot him at once, as he fell dead in his tracks.
