The open intimidation, the direct brutal threat, the plain hint or the clear orders were common enough episodes in every country election; but these coarse methods are less universal and less effectual than others. The rural laborer is the most helpless and defenseless of English citizens. All the instruments by which he lives, all the engines of public authority all the avenues to light are under the control of the squire. The squire owns the land on which the laborer works and the cottage in which the laborer lives. Through his ownership of the land the squire dictates to the farmer who is the direct employer of the laborer. He stuffs the bench which administers the law. fills the county council, which is the organ of local government. He appoints the parson, who supports the squire's instructions with the thunder of heaven. and through the parson he appoints the schoolmaster, who makes education a way approved by the squire. The bread the laborer eats, the house he lives in. the church he prays in, the school he studies in, the courts before which he appears, all belong to a single system which encompasses him, and in every action of his life stamps upon him his sub-

MURDER OFFICIALS

Gang at McKee's Rocks Deliberately Shoot Down Manager and Cashier and Fire at Citizens.

Pittsburg, April 5. - At 8:30 this evening the most sensational back robbery in the history of Pennsylvania, if not the entire country, occurred at Mc-Kee's Rocks, a suburb, six miles below Pittsburg. Employees of the Victor Banking Company were preparing to close for the night, when four men stepped from the shadows outside. Two, with drawn revolvers, warned away all passing pedestrians, while His vengeance when he's been ignored the other two went inside the bank and opened on all inside.

> Samuel Friedman, manager, was killed with three bullets while trying to protect \$5,000 on the counters of the bank from the robbers. Ignatz Schwartz, cashier, shot through the head, died in McKee's Rocks hospi-

Robert King, a citizen, shot down on the street by the robbers, as they ran with the plunder; at McKee's Rocks hospital; will live. Andrew Milko, mill workman, struck

Shot Right and Left. McKee's Rocks and Schoenville ad-joining were each terrorized for about blood, rode up and down through the town, shooting right and left. It was blood, and Millko also shot.

From what can be gathered by deduction, the two who entered the bank appeared to have walked right up to the cashier's window and shot Ignatz Schwartz in his tracks, then grabbed the great piles of money, which they stuffed into bags slung over their dently in the back part of the bank, attending to the big safes, was seen to come rushing out of the bruk after the four men, and as he paired on the
