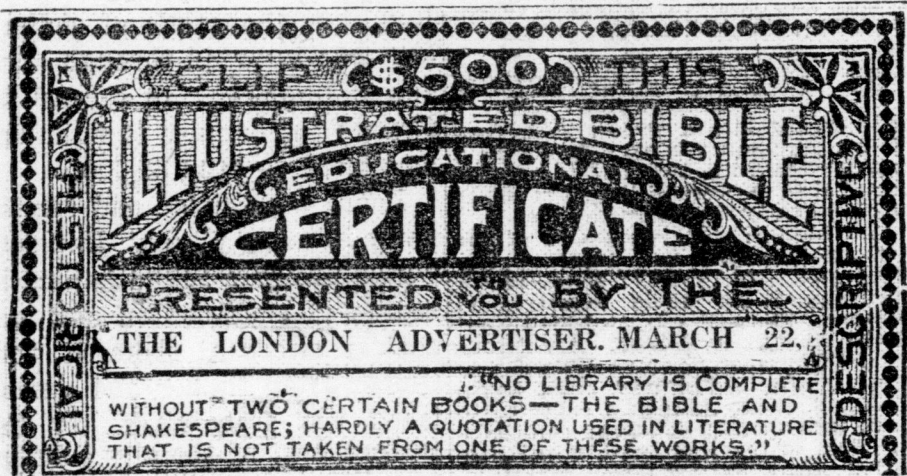

COUNTRY'S REVENUE CLOSE TO \$170,000,000

Increase For Last Fiscal Year Will Approximate Thirty-Three Millions.

Ottawa, March 21.—The revenue of the Dominion for the fiscal year which closes on Monday next will be close to \$170,000,000, according to the figures to date of the Finance Department. This represents an increase of approximately thirty-three millions over the revenue of the preceding fiscal year. The total expenditure for the year is estimated at between \$133,000,000 and \$154,000,000, leaving a surplus of some sixteen millions over all expenditures on both consolidated fund and capital accounts. Last year the total expenditure was \$131,046,764, or some twenty-three millions less than the Government has spent this year.

On consolidated fund account this year the total expenditure will be about \$111,000,000, and on capital and special accounts about \$43,000,000. The increased cost of the administration of ordinary business of the Government this year under Premier Borden has been approximately fifteen million dollars. The steadily growing revenue under the Fielding tariff will, however, probably enable Finance Minister White to present next month a budget statement showing another record surplus of revenue over all ordinary expenditures.

TORONTO, HAMILTON HARD HIT BY GALE

Ninety Miles an Hour Wind Did Great Damage at Ambitious City.

SWEPT ACROSS TORONTO

Wind Plays Havoc in Streets, Carrying Away Several Buildings Under Construction.

Hamilton, March 21.—Hamilton knows after its experiences today something of the terrors of an equinoctial gale. From one o'clock till a late hour this evening a hurricane blew through this city, carrying havoc and suffering in its wake. It is difficult to estimate the damage done. No one suffered to any alarming extent, but the number of those affected will be in the hundreds.

A conservative estimate is \$100,000. This morning it rained, and just before noon a very warm breeze sprang up. In an hour this was followed by a perfect hurricane. The velocity of the wind could not have been less than 90 miles an hour.

The ice was blown out of the bay in record time, and at the beach the signs of the waves running mountains high was one long to be remembered. At first citizens were not inclined to take the matter seriously, but as the hours passed, and the violence of the wind showed itself in every direction, everybody spent a few anxious hours. Hundreds of chimneys throughout the city were blown down. In the vicinity of Lotbridge street alone thirty chimneys were destroyed. This will give a fair idea of the way the wind performed. In the centre of the city pedestrians found it hard to navigate.

Heavy Losses. Women were unable at times to make their way along, and flying shingles, slates, bricks and other debris made the task exceedingly dangerous. Dozens of plate glass windows in the business streets were destroyed. The workers were just putting the finishing touches on the three magnificent plate glass windows for Heintzman & Co.'s new store, when a terrific gust crashed into them, and hurled the plate glass into the middle of the street.

Others to suffer heavy loss in this respect were T. H. Pratt & Co., P. Arland, the Union Bank, the Central Club and others. Swinging signs were blown, heater skelter. A large sign over the Hilda Cigar Company, built of steel, was crumpled up like paper. A big steel sign over a clothing store in front of the city hall was blown over like a paper fan, and the sign of the day was not to pin any faith on a swinging or overhead sign when the wind was blowing 90 miles an hour. At the corner of Main and James streets, where the Federal Life building stands, it was impossible to stand up under the force of the wind. There is a heavy projecting copper cornice on this building, and it was ripped and torn in such a manner that the police were afraid it would crash to the street in a few minutes, and the street was roped off for the safety of pedestrians.

Hotel Unroofed. A portion of the roof of the Royal Hotel was blown off, and Campbell's tailoring establishment on King street west suffered in a similar way. At Mount Pleasant a frame house was blown completely off its foundations, and other dwellings there suffered considerably. Fortunately there were no casualties, although several people were slightly injured by the flying debris.

Swept Across Toronto. Toronto, March 21.—Toronto was held in the grip of one of the worst gales today that has swept over the city for some years. From early morning the wind played havoc in the streets, and during the day the stories of two large apartment houses under construction, a theatre and a number of other buildings were only partially completed.

Sweeping over the city at a velocity of about 50 miles an hour, and increasing in sudden gusts to over 90, the wind swept away many chimneys, signboards and broke numerous large glass windows. A number of large signs, some of which were electrical, were torn from their fastenings and battered to bits against walls and posts.

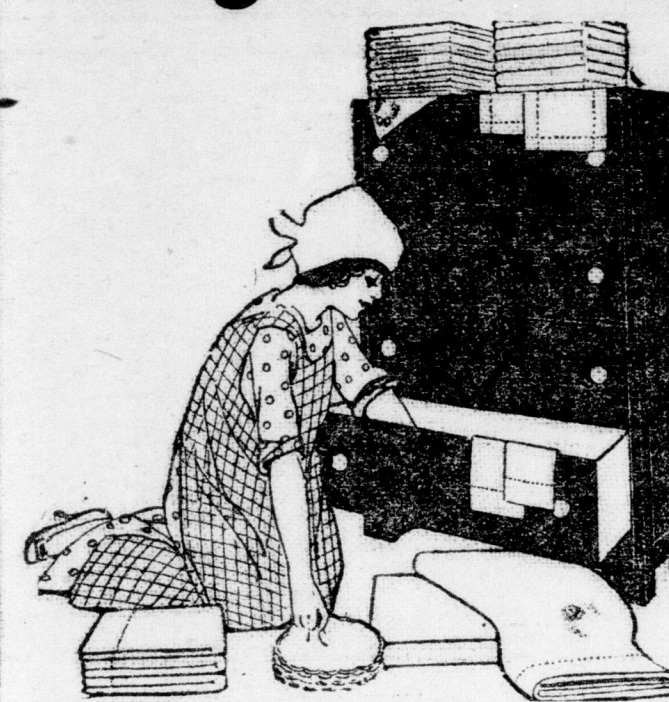

works, M. Thierry, minister of commerce and postoffice, Louis F. A. P. Masse, and minister of labor, M. Choron.

The office of under-secretary of the postoffice has been eliminated from the new cabinet, and a new under-secretaryship of mercantile marine created. This position will be taken by Deputy A. P. DeMonzie.

There is general approval here of the policy of President Poincare in selecting M. Barthou, a man of long ministerial experience, to head the new Government, and it is considered that the constitutional crisis, due to the victory of Georges Clemenceau in the Senate, is overcome, at least for the present. The make-up of the new cabinet consolidates them.

Paris, March 21.—Jean Barthou, who was requested by President Poincare to form a ministry to succeed that of Premier Briand, which resigned last Tuesday, this evening went to the Elysee Palace and submitted to the President the personnel of the new Government. The portfolios are distributed as follows:

Premier and minister of public instruction, Jean Barthou; minister of justice, Antony Dauterive; minister of finance, Charles Dumont; minister of foreign affairs, Etienne Pichon; minister of the interior, Louis L. Klotz; minister of war, Eugene Etienne; minister of marine, Pierre Baudin; minister of agriculture, Etienne Clementel; minister of the colonies, Jean Morel; minister of public
