# SCORES NAVY BILL AT ROUSING RALLY

Hugh Guthrie Says the Borden Government Should Dissolve and Go to the Polls.

POLICY OF ACTION

Is Urged by Liberals and Conforms With Parish Naval Authorities' Needs.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Elora, Jan. 8. - At a rousing rally here this evening Mr. Hugh Guthrie dealt at length with the navy bill. He declared it was not the Liberal policy to obstruct. He thought it was the duty of the present Government to dissolve and go to the polls.

Had the newspapers of either party or the speakers on any political plat-form during the last election campaign ever discussed the naval policy? He knew they had not. He quoted Mr. Churchill, Lord Charles Beresford, Lord Milner and Sir Charles Tupper, as all opposed to the idea of giving a cash contribution to the British Government. Mr. Foster had said himself on the floor of the House that a cash contribution smacked too much like giving tribute. Mr. Foster had also said they must make a beginning, however small, when referring to forming a Canadian navy. Mr. Borden himself had declared in favor of a Canadian navy, and had contin-ued to adhere to this solution of the problem until the fall of 1909, when Mr. Monk delivered a speech in Quebec against any naval policy at all. Mr. Guthrie, continuing, quoted from Mr. Borden's speech at a banquet in London, where he was reported have said that without representation in the councils of the empire. 
