After reviewing the war and its consequences, Mr. King emphasized the fact that the "hateful and devilish" spirit bred by the conflict would have to be combatted by a new attitde and a new spirit, if the problems confronting the country were to be solved.

Usurped Sovereign Right.

The Liberal leader made practically no reference to the platform adopted at the Ottawa convention last summer, but stated that in his forthcoming tour he would deal with it in detail.

Mr. King announced at the outset the contract of t Mr. King announced at the outset that it was his intention to review briefly what appeared to be the outstanding features of the political situation as it exists in Canada today. He would make suggestions, he said, which, as respects government, are most required to enable the country with the vast problems conwith the vast problems cor nting it at the beginning of the new year.

Discussing the war and its consequences, the leader of the Opposition declared that it is impossible to separate the present from the past, and for many a year the war would remain a mighty influence in world affairs. 

Britain's Standing Army Is to Consist of 300,000 Men

London, Wednesday, Jan. 7 .- The cabinet this week will decide the size of Great Britain's future army, says the Daily Mail. Military heads believe, according to the Mail, that the minimum compatible with natreaty, will total 300,000. This compares with an army of 238,000 before the war. A factor governing the decision is finance, the newspaper says, pointing out that before the war the upkeep of the army totalled about £29,000,000 yearly. It estimates the army in the future, even with radical economy and only partial reorganization, will cost about £70,-000,000 annually.

THIRTY MILLION RUSSIANS HAVE DIED IN LAST THREE YEARS FROM VIOLENCE, FAMINE AND DISEASE

Death Toll Grew to Tremendous Proportions As Bolsheviki Gained Control in Former Great Empire-Granddaughter of Ulysses Grant Makes Appeal.

New York, Jan. 7.—Thirty million men, women and children have died in Russia from violence, famine and disease during the last three years, according to a statement on present conditions in the once great empire, which was made today by Princess Cantacuzene-Speransky, granddaughter of Ulysses Grant, in an appeal in behalf of the American Central Committee for Russian Relief. The tremendous death toll mentioned by the princess was exclusive, she said, of five million men who had laid down their lives on the Russian front fighting for the allies. Princess Cantacuzene, whose husband is a former commander of the czar's bodyguard, was an eye-witness to many of the terrible scenes which resulted in the establishment of the soviet regime in Russia. She described how hundreds of German spies and agents poured into Russia following the revolution, and industriously spread Bolshevik propaganda

BRITISH POUND WILL BE COMPUTED AT DOLLAR BELOW THE STANDARD

Washington, Jan. 7.—The British pound will be computed at \$3.85 in American money by the war department in making January disbursements, it was announced today. The franc will be "stabilized" for this month at eleven to the dollar, and the Italian lire at thirteen.
